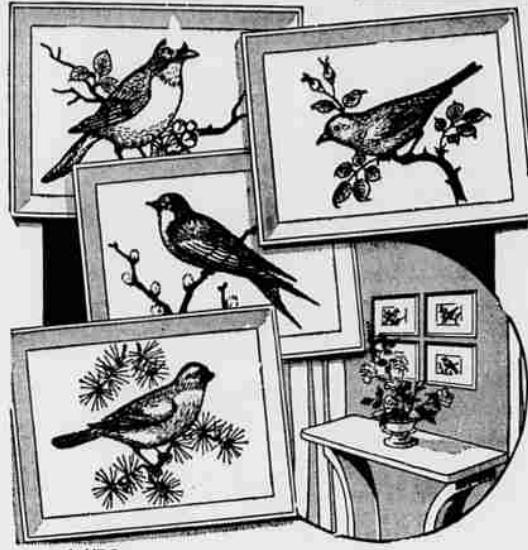

GOOD TASTE TODAY

In-between day and evening hours always leave guests confused about their clothes. A woman, by the simple expedient of adding a jacket, can of course make any not too elaborate evening dress appropriate for earlier-than-evening wear. But the in-between-hour clothes for a man are still perplexing him, as the following (very typical) letter illustrates:

"What does the well dressed man wear to a half past five o'clock wedding at church, which is to be followed by a big reception at the country club? Does he wear evening dress to church at the wrong hour, or does he wear day dress at the evening reception? This wedding is expected to be the social highlight of the season."

The answer to this is of course made fairly easy by the fact that the season is summer and that a white dinner coat is worn every evening in broad daylight. This fact will help to keep a white tuxedo coat (even with black evening trousers) from looking out of place at the ceremony, especially since every one knows that evening dress will be essential at the reception which is to follow.

Suitable Clothes for a Waitress

Dear Mrs. Post: Please tell me what kind of stockings and shoes my waitress should wear. She wears black dresses with fine embroidered white cuffs and collar and matching aprons. I thought black stockings, but she seems to think these too dark.

Answer: A medium gray looks best, since they give the effect of thinnest black. But a quite light gray would be very pretty if she is young or if she has slim ankles. Black patent leather pumps are smartest but black kid much more comfortable and equally suitable. In either case, the heels of course should be no more than medium height, and toes may not be open.

When Hostess is Very Tired

Dear Mrs. Post: I believe it is supposed to be proper for a hostess to suggest that her guests might like to retire. But what comes next.

If after she suggests this, they say "Oh, no, we're not tired; this is the mere shank of the evening for us." The poor hostess in this case was dead for sleep, having gotten up several hours that day before any one else and having spent the entire day trying to show them a good time.

Answer: According to rule, the hostess asks, "Wouldn't you like to go to bed?" (The word "retire" is one of the taboos of good taste.) Then if the answer as you suggest, it may be that many guests would expect her to sit up all night with them. But I can at least name one hostess who would tell them to stay up just as long as they like, have a tray brought in with whatever refreshments the ice box affords, and then bid them "Goodnight!"—and that hostess is writing these words!
