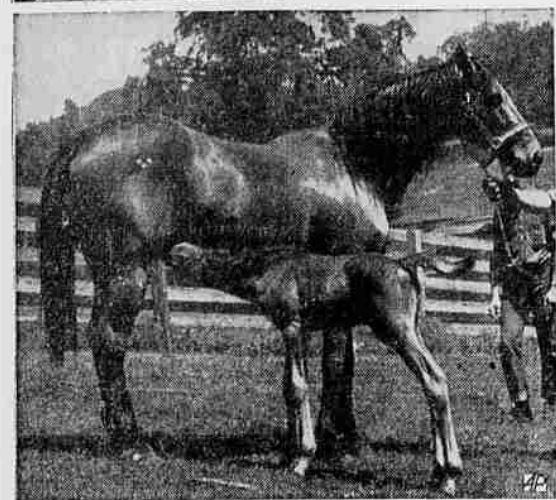


It's Papa Seabiscuit Now

Macphail Says Deal Largest In History

St. Louis, June 13 (AP)—The Brooklyn Dodgers, who exchanged their daffy ways for first place, eyed the National league pennant more manifestly today with the acquisition of slugger Joe Medwick and pitcher Curt Davis of the Cardinals.

The eleventh hour deal, which brought four Dodger players to the Red Birds, was "the biggest money transaction even in the National league," Brooklyn president Larry Macphail said. However, the exact sum is the club's secret.

The known top check was the \$185,000 which the Chicago Cubs paid the Cardinals for Dizzy Dean in 1938.

Macphail, who flew east last night after an all-day conference consummating the deal, chuckled over his new players, whose sale was surprising only in that it included Davis. The Dodgers were known to have been dickering for Medwick, a close friend of Brooklyn manager Leo Durocher. The latter said in Pittsburgh he was "elated" to get Joe and Kirk.
