

Forest Fires Follow Heat

Portland June 13 (AP)—The first heat wave of the 1940 season resulted today in an outbreak of forest fires at scattered points.

A forest fire spread over 400 acres of out over land in the vicinity of Glenbrook in southern Benton county and 200 CCC youths and volunteers were set to battle it. The fire threatened good stands of green timber. It was whipped by a steady wind and burned out of control.

Three forest fires burned in the Klamath basin following temperatures up to 91 degrees. Two small fires were reported near Chemult, Ore., by the Klamath Protective association.

One 400 acre blaze in the Deschutes national forest was fought by CCC youths and loggers.

Several hundred CCC youths stationed at Camp Wikup near Bend, Ore., were called to fight a forest fire which had spread over an estimated area of 2000 acres on the Deschutes national forest in the Wickup basin on the upper Deschutes river. Deschutes Fire Fought by CCC

Bend, Ore., June 13 (AP)—Nearly 500 CCC boys from central Oregon camps continued today to battle a forest fire which had spread over an estimated area of 2000 acres on the Deschutes national forest in the Wickup basin on the upper Deschutes river. Forest officials hoped that the fire could be brought under control today.

The fire was under control yesterday morning, but high winds whipped it out of bounds to the southeast late yesterday. Hazy smoke was visible yesterday as far away as Bend, 40 miles to the northeast.

The fire was believed to have started during brush burning operations in the basin, site of the Wickup reservoir, part of the Deschutes project. Part of the damage is on ground to be cleared and later submerged when the dam is completed.

Mt. Angel court of the organization received second prize, also a large flag of similar style and type. Incidentally, the state convention was held in conjunction with the annual Patron Saint day of the Sublimity parish, St. Boniface. The entire day given over to sports and programs, with a dinner to which over 400 participated served at noon.

Boat Capsizes With Two Couples

Oak Harbor, Wash., June 13 (AP)—Adrift all night, after their outboard motor boat capsized, two Seattle couples were recovering at a doctor's office here today from shock and exposure.

Rescuers credited Mrs. George A. Tallman, 31, with saving the lives of her husband, and her brother-in-law and sister, Mr. and Mrs. Forrest Frye. She tied them to the capsized craft when they became unconscious and swam ashore to get aid when the craft finally grounded on a handbar off Strawberry Point.

Mrs. Tallman said the four set out for a short boat ride from Utsaladdy, north end of Camano Island, last night. They ran out of gasoline about 9 o'clock and high waves upset the boat.

The craft drifted about eight miles, until it ran aground at 5:30 a. m., and Mrs. Tallman was able to swim ashore.

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Captain May To Tell Story

Captain George May, lone survivor of the Oshkosh which capsized on Columbia river bar a good many years ago, and who was saved in an almost miraculous manner, will be among the veteran steamboat men who will attend the 15th annual reunion and picnic of the Veteran Steamboatmen of the West at Champeog park Sunday, June 30.

Captain May was below looking to the engines of the distressed boat when he was suddenly aware that the Oshkosh had turned over and he was imprisoned. Almost overcome by gas he was in a stupor for many hours, and when he came to observed a small ray of light overhead. He broke out a hatch and crawled out to discover that the boat had drifted into the harbor and a crowd of people was on the beach. All other members of the crew about eight, were lost. As one of the reunion features Captain May will relate his experience by way of an interview.

The reunion flag raising will take place at 1 o'clock with Dr. P. O. Riley leading the ceremony. Memorial services at 1:30 will be broadcast by KOIN, Portland.

Speakers will be Lieutenant Colonel C. H. Lee and Richard Montgomery, both of Portland, and Judge Fred W. Wilson of The Dalles will be chairman. Music and entertainment will be in charge of Prof. John Wallace Graham. Assisting in the program will be the Newberg Sea Scouts and The Dalles Junior band.

Oregon Guide Book on Sale

Oregon's first complete guide book, "Oregon: End of the Trail," written by the WPA Oregon Writers' project, is now on sale. The book, written with both tourist and general reader in mind, gives a comprehensive picture of contemporary Oregon with a backward glance to the days of the fur trader and the covered wagon. Chapters on natural resources, industries, education, art, literature and tall tales comprise about one-third of the book's contents, while sections devoted to eleven of the larger cities and towns give complete tourist information.

The Oregon Guide book is one of the WPA American Guide series of travel books, of which a volume has been, or is to be, published for each state and territory of the union. Like the other books of the series, the Oregon Guide contains a wealth of information on where to go and what to see, the history and lore of each locality as well as mile-by-mile descriptions of ten major and twenty-five secondary towns over the state. Included in the more than five hundred pages of this encyclopedic guide book is information concerning the state's recreation areas, laws controlling traffic, hunting and fishing; the historic, geographic and geological points of interest, and the flora and fauna of Oregon. One hundred and twenty-five photographic illustrations, a four-color pocket map of the state, double-page maps of various cities, and a tour key map all add to the usefulness of the volume. The book was published by Binford and Mort of Portland and if not yet offered for sale locally, is obtainable from the publishers.
