

Safety Council Considers Silverton Suggestions

Editorial

Residents of Turner will go to the polls Saturday to vote for or against a proposed amendment to the city charter authorizing the city council to issue and sell not to exceed \$3000 worth of general obligation bonds and to use the proceeds to provide an adequate supply of water and improve the present water distribution system. Voting will be at the Masonic hall from 9 o'clock in the morning to 4 o'clock in the afternoon.

There has been some discussion and dissension about the matter but there is only one question—either the voter is for the issue of the bonds or he is against it. Whether these should be voted or refused is a matter of local consideration and this is written only that the issues may be clearly understood. Information is provided by the official notice of the special election.

The bonds are to be known as the City of Turner water system bonds, to be issued in denominations prescribed by the council and shall mature in annual principal installments as shall be redeemed and retired in 15 years from the date of issue, not to exceed six per cent interest per annum, payable semi-annually and sold from time to time as the council shall determine. If the people want the bonds they will vote "yes"; if they do not want them they will vote "no"—CKL.

Curb Licensing Action Taken, Albany Council

Albany—Service station driveways will hereafter be limited in Albany both as to number and extent, insofar as each separate ownership is concerned, as the result of action by the city council in passing a driveway licensing ordinance.

The new law, it is explained in the emergency clause, is necessary to prevent the undue usurpation of parking space by automobile filling and service stations within the city limits.

A license fee of \$1.25 for each ten feet of curbing taken up by each driveway is imposed. Restrictions for width of single driveways are: 50 percent of total frontage of project if frontage is under 30 feet; 20 feet if frontage of entire station is between 30 and 50 feet; 25 feet if frontage is between 50 and 75 feet, and 30 feet if frontage is more than 75 feet.

Landscaping Approved

Albany—County Judge J. J. Barrett has received a message from U. S. Senator Rufus Holman stating that the works progress administration has approved a \$10,478 project providing for the landscaping and general improvement of the grounds surrounding the new Linn county courthouse. However, the message stated that approval is subject to the discretion of the state WPA. Inasmuch as WPA projects are being suspended in Oregon for the summer to help relieve a seasonal labor shortage, Judge Barrett stated that he did not expect the project to be available until fall. This, however, is a suitable arrangement with the court, Barrett stated.

Sunday Closing Sought

Albany—Whether or not pool halls and bowling alleys shall be permitted to operate here Sunday afternoon is a matter which the Albany city council has under serious consideration. Mayor A. G. Sanders announced Thursday. The matter came up when a local bowling alley proprietor requested action toward permitting him to operate his alleys on Sunday afternoon. At present, it was found, city ordinances prohibit such Sunday activities. Similar requests have come from pool hall operators, the mayor stated.

Parking Plans Are Considered; Bikes are Target

Silverton—The last meeting before summer vacation of the Silverton safety council was held Thursday night in the city council rooms with Norman Naegeli presiding and Lester Rue serving as secretary.

The arrival of the "Oregon Traffic Safety Exchange," published by Earl Snell, secretary of state, was appreciated and helpful suggestions for the future of the council were presented.

Local hazards were mentioned and letters to the city council will be sent in an effort to have these corrected.

A depression in the pavement at the junctions of both Oak and High streets with First, formerly used as a storm drain, was mentioned as dangerous to drivers unacquainted with the town. Members of the safety council were wondering why the road crews had not covered the railway tracks on North Water street as had been agreed to by the Southern Pacific company and the city council.

Lester Rue announced that with the Rotary, Legion, Lions and Active clubs and the Chamber of Commerce back of the move the highway commission was now ready to place a calendar sign of the time and place of meeting of these organizations near the entrances of town.

Shrubbery and trees were said to hinder the light near the Eastman brothers plant at the depot and at the junction of Mill and Oak streets with a bad accident recently on Mill street.

Double, triple and quadruple parking on North Water, Main and Oak streets was condemned as was the condition near the Methodist church on Sundays with people making U-turns on McClain and Main streets. Suggestions that more vacant close-in city blocks be made fit for free parking. Alfred Adams was commended for his efforts in this line.

With the town having a bicycle ordinance the safety council feels that these laws should be enforced with numerous reports at the meeting last night of children riding double-cross on the main streets of town among the car traffic and urging the enforcement officers to be on the job in checking such hazards that are becoming worse as vacation time is on. It was suggested that bicycle riders follow all rules of traffic required of automobiles in signs and stops as well as keeping on the right side of the streets.

The safety council will be appreciative of reports for the safety of children, pedestrians and drivers to either Norman Naegeli, president, or Lester Rue, secretary.

Scio—Farm horses really get old in the Scio community. G. L. Sutherland, native Scioan now beyond 83 and still working horses on his farm near this city, stated recently that a mare 34 years old, reared on his farm, was in the harness at times this season.

H. A. Dolzal, pioneer farmer in the Burgen Hollow community about nine miles southeast of Scio, is using a mare 29 and another 24 years of age. Longevity of horses' lives is accounted for by some farmers by the fact that the difficult harness season is of comparatively brief duration, and the further fact that use of farm machinery is increasing.

Since residing in Portland Goetz has been chief coordinator of the psychometric laboratory in the interest of occupational survey in connection with the Portland schools and federal interests.

Goetz explained that in the two years since his being in charge of the project, more than 70,000 persons between the ages of 16 and 25 years had voluntarily taken the laboratory tests with high school juniors now being included in those privileged to ascertain their fitness for special work.

The occupational survey work is new to the northwest and is becoming a phase of readjustment for the younger group of men and women in helping them find their places in life where they may enjoy their occupations and professions and make progress in their chosen work.

A feature of the day was the basket dinner for which Walter Gerth of West Salem, who formerly resided at Lincoln, gave ice cream for dessert.

At the business meeting in the afternoon Ralph Shepard was elected president, Worth W. Henry, vice-president, and Mrs. Lois Simpson Crawford re-elected secretary-treasurer. An interesting impromptu program recalled many historic and humorous incidents of the old time Lincoln and Zena.

Ralph Shepard spoke of a mill at Zena which was situated just below the W. J. Crawford home and operated by David McCarty and of finding a deep ditch which had evidently been used for draining the lake on the old donation land claim bridge was swept downstream in 1888.

Mrs. Skaffe was hemmed in by water and was rescued by her husband who came down the flue and took her back that way. The bridge lodged below Lincoln on an island and was an interesting object to local boys who spent profitable days removing bolts and nails from the wreckage. Ralph Shepard said that during the flood Captain Jack Spong, brother of John M. Spong of Salem, rescued a goat which came floating down on a log and the next day she had twin kids, which was the start of a nice herd.
