Norway is invaded on its heels but fights through May and part of June. 9. Luxembourg is invaded in May. 10. The Netherlands fall in May. 11. Belgium capitulates May 28. 12. Mrs. Sigurdson of Salem, instructor of the Silverton branch of the class, stated that nine passed the examination 100 per cent grade. One elderly gentleman, a German, could neither read nor write the English language and entered the class when it was instigated around two years ago. He passed a high grade and was one of the happiest of the celebrants.

The citizenship class was begun in Silverton through the efforts of F. M. Powell as chairman of the American Legion community service committee as an Americanization effort with some aid given at that time by the WPA for the sponsorship of the project. The Silverton school board permitted the classes to be held in a classroom for a time. Later both these privileges were discontinued but the students were so interested that they assumed their own obligations to use the armory club room early each Tuesday evening for their lecture and instruction hour. Mrs. Sigurdson is well prepared for the instructional role as she speaks several different languages and takes more than an ordinary interest in helping any one who is sincerely striving for citizenship.

George Manolis was local American Legion post commander at the time of the origin of the class here and gave personal assistance for the project.

Heavy Traffic Now Permitted On New Streets

Lebanon—Local authorities opened the newly paved blocks on Second and Maple streets to heavy traffic Friday. Previously only light vehicles had been permitted use of the thoroughfares.

The new pavement on Maple street between Main and Park, was completed Wednesday and will be open to light traffic about July 1 and about two weeks later this too will be opened to the heavier trucks and heavy vehicles.

Grading of Park and Maple intersection and the block between Maple and Grant on Park has been completed and pouring of cement will begin immediately it is said and if everything goes as rapidly as expected this pavement will be ready to be opened about July 15. Under the present schedule, Academy street between Main and Second streets will be the next block to be paved, this project to be followed by grading of West Tanager in preparation for oiling by the county road crew.

Project Nearly Ready
Lebanon—The \$85,000 Lacombe irrigation project is rapidly approaching completion, and there is every reason to believe water will be running in the approximately 20 miles of canals by July 4 or shortly thereafter, it was reported here.

The main ditch, some four miles long, is substantially completed, and the several laterals with flumes should be finished by the end of this month, according to John Thomas, head of WPA operations in Linn county. All of the siphon pipe which is used across two gulches, has been placed, and the sponsors have practically completed construction of a temporary earth dam on Crabtree creek.

Major phases unfinished include erection of 400 feet of flume at the upper end of the main ditch, drilling of four concrete wells for the siphon pipes, and installation of concrete box culverts at 14 road crossings.

The huge undertaking, when completed, will bring water to approximately 3000 acres of land. WPA funds allotted to the project were \$85,000, and the balance was financed by the benefiting property owners. Employment has run as high as 80 men, with some 50 now being assigned to the force.

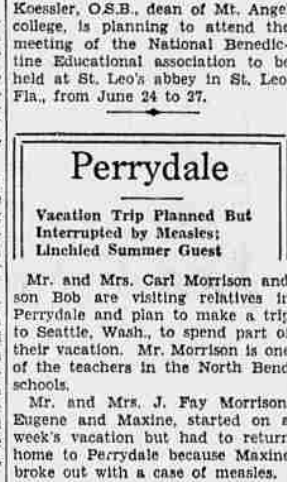
