

Albany Starts Holiday Plans: Schools Report

Albany—Albany's Fourth of July program was definitely outlined Monday at a meeting of the program committee, headed by Dr. Joe Gray, and Hollis Hull, president of the Albany Junior Chamber of Commerce.

The first event will be the selection of the queen of the two-day celebration, on July 2. The next scheduled event will be the dedication of the new Linn county courthouse on July 3 at 2 p. m., with state supreme court Justice Percy R. Kelly, formerly of Albany, giving the dedicatory address. Prior to the dedication, Earl Snell, secretary of state, will present the county with a flag, the gift of the Linn county veterans' organization. The flag pole which stands before the courthouse will also be dedicated at this time by Snell.

A program of aquatics at the Albany municipal swimming pool is scheduled to follow the dedication and the coronation of the queen will take place as a feature of the Albany-Silverton baseball game at Central field.

On July 4 a parade will be held and during the parade an air show will start, under supervision of Howard Burleson, who will also engineer a plane demonstration July 5.

The celebration will be wound up with a baseball game the night of July 4, to be followed by a large display of fireworks.

Budgets Are Sufficient

Albany—Albany schools were operated within their budgets during the past year, the financial statement of Dan Brenneman, school clerk, indicated Tuesday.

The budget committee estimated last year that it would require \$123,895 exclusive of debt service to conduct the schools of district No. 5 for the year. The actual expenditures in this category were \$122,711.16, leaving an unexpended balance of \$1,183.84.

The report shows total expenditures of \$1,015,566.50, but this total includes debt service which in turn includes payment of \$22,000 in short term loans, and interest on them.

According to clerk Brenneman the bonded indebtedness of the school district has been reduced to \$167,000.

Parish Priest At Woodburn

Effective June 17, by official appointment of his excellency, Archbishop Howard, the Rev. Valentine L. Mollenbier, becomes a parish priest of St. Luke's parish, Woodburn.

Father Mollenbier succeeds Rev. Joseph Heesaker who passed away last January. Father Daniel O'Connell has been administrator since that time. Father O'Connell becomes chaplain of the state institutions and will live at St. Joseph's church, Salem.

Father Mollenbier will have as his assistant the Rev. John J. McGrenra, formerly assistant at St. Rose's church, Portland.

St. Luke's parish is one of the largest in the state. The church was built in 1930. The lovely new church stands as a monument to Father Ruble's untiring zeal and labors. The church is free of debt.

Father Mollenbier took his high school, college and philosophy courses at Mt. Angel college and his theology in Denver, Colo., and St. Paul, Minn. He was the second priest ordained by Archbishop Howard in January, 1927. Since then Father Mollenbier has been assistant pastor at Old St. Mary's in Portland and at St. Rose's church, Portland.

He was pastor of the Polish church on Interstate avenue for two years. For the last five and one-half years he was archdiocesan director of Catholic Charities, Inc.

Father Mollenbier is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Mollenbier, who have been residents of Mt. Angel since 1907. Clarence Mollenbier, a brother of the newly appointed pastor at Woodburn, lives at 1583 Mission street, Salem.

Rosedale Denies Bus Transportation

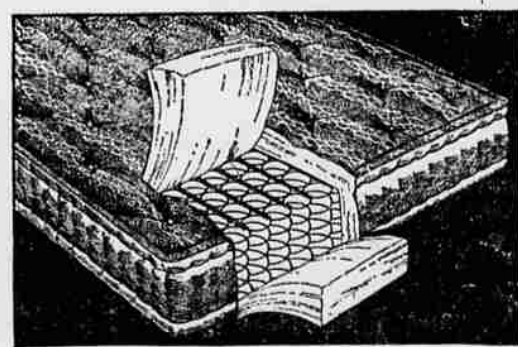

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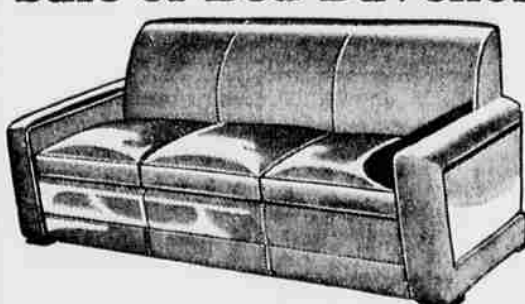
