Special Summer Session to Close

Outstanding warrants issued during the year and not paid for want of funds amounted to \$3,351.64. Taxes to be received soon will take care of this item, it was stated.

Operation and maintenance of the school plant totaled \$1,743.49; the clerk's tabulations indicated. Estimated receipts for the coming school year (June 17, 1940, to June 16, 1941) were placed at \$5,588.80; estimated expenditures, \$12,680. Balance to be raised by district tax was stated as \$6,091.20, less bond and interest item of \$800.
