

Warning Issued Against Carelessness in Forests

Season Brings Warning Word For Forester

Lebanon—One smoker's carelessness in the forests near Lebanon could result in elimination of lumber manufacturing of all descriptions in this community, Mark Hanna, department head in the U. S. forest service, warned members of the Lebanon Lions club at its weekly meeting Thursday.

Hanna, who was introduced by District Ranger R. C. Burgess, said this warning might be illustrated in the Tillamook region, where not long ago a moment's carelessness not only destroyed millions of dollars in timber but cut off entirely or in some way reduced the payroll of nearly 70,000 persons.

Precaution in properly extinguishing the camp fire, a cigarette or match, insures as much protection for the future of this nation as does the construction of a new battleship, the speaker declared.

Dr. A. Mahaffey of Linfield college, sponsor of the state high school baseball tourney, presented a cup to Lebanon high school, which captured the championship, and another trophy to Bill Ellis, the pitcher, who was voted the most outstanding of all players of teams in the meet.

Jobs Are Provided

Lebanon—The Lebanon office of the state employment service has made 725 placements since its establishment here May 11, according to reports of local officials. Of these, 369 were classified as "regular" and 356 as "supplementary or casual." The two largest employers were the Industrial Engineers and Contractors, builders of the Evans Products company plywood plant, which accounted for 95 of the placements, and the Spencer packing plant, with which were placed 179.

Projects Are Outstanding

Lebanon—The projects of Glenn Kobow, state president of the F.F.A., have been selected the most outstanding of all projects conducted by local chapter members. The choice was made by instructors of the Albany and Lebanon chapters. Kobow's projects are in dairy, swine, squash, carrots, alfalfa, oats and vetch hay.

He failed in his effort and was fatally injured. A second logging truck took the body from the road as the first driver had not observed the accident. Funeral services are being held in Corvallis today.

Bud Clark Enlists In Regular Army

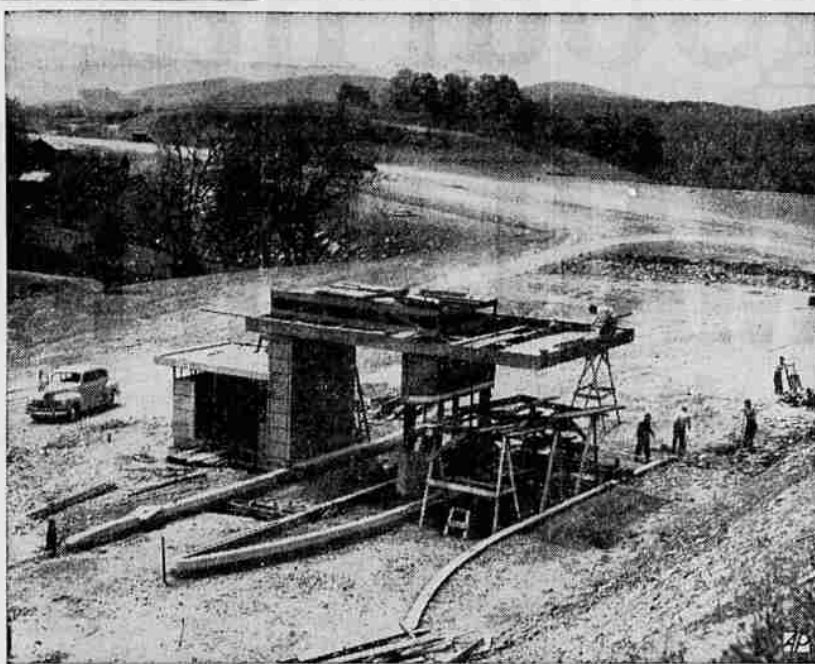

Portage Railway Brought to Light By Excavation

Aurora—A bit of literally long-buried Oregon City history, harking back to an early tramway around the Willamette river falls, has recently been brought to light by road builders.

Excavators on the super-highway project uncovered, on Fifth between Main and Water streets, old wooden ties and a number of spikes, marking the rail line, used until the 1880's as a portage route for riverboat cargo.

Prior to installation of the Oregon City locks, the tramway operated between Canemah and Oregon City, approximately a mile, old-timers recall. A warehouse and wharf then was located behind the present courthouse, and another warehouse stood at Canemah.

Groceries Take Food Stamps

Jefferson—The local grocery stores are participating in the federal food stamp plan for distribution of surplus food commodities to be introduced into Marion county, July 1.

Headquarters of the stamp plan will be at 463 Ferry street in Salem, and stamp plan participants living outside of Salem may obtain stamps by addressing the stamp issuing office by mail. The stamps may be used in any participating store in the home community.

All persons certified as eligible to participate in the stamp plan by the public welfare commission will be permitted to purchase orange food order stamps which may be exchanged at face value for "any food for internal human consumption," except liquor, tobacco in any form, or food usually eaten on the premises of the store where purchased.

The purchaser of orange stamps will then be given without charge half as many blue surplus food order stamps, which will be good at face value for foods listed as surplus by the secretary of agriculture.

Food bought with stamps will be at the same price as cash-paying customers. Money will not be issued as change on a purchase, but credit slips given instead.
