

Albany Rushes Cannery Work; Plant Opened

Albany, Ore.—Plans for the opening of the newly organized Albany Cannery company Wednesday are being rushed with a crew of men working at top speed reconditioning the old Lilly Seed plant site for occupancy by the middle of next week.

P. J. Burk and W. B. Jewett, operators, have announced that the plant will do custom canning and will do some commercial packing, starting with cherries and berries next week, but this year's pack will be largely experimental, they said.

The operators themselves are financing the project this year, but pledges of funds by local business men are in reserve for use if and when expansion is deemed justifiable.

New Plant Inspected
Albany, Ore.—More than 1000 persons from Linn and Benton counties swarmed into the new and gigantic Charles J. Lilly Seed company plant here yesterday to inspect the recently completed grain storing and receiving plant and to be luncheon guests of the company.

Farmers of this vicinity enjoyed the privilege of being conducted through the establishment under the guidance of company officials, who explained the uses of all new facilities and outlined the plan by which the company will operate at its local plant.

J. E. Bole has been assigned to the management of the Albany plant.

Tower Is Felled
Albany, Ore.—The northeast tower of the old Linn county court house was felled yesterday morning by wreckers of the Sunset Wrecking company of Portland, with implements similar to that employed Wednesday when the northwest tower was hurled to the ground used in bringing down the smaller of the two spirals.

The process of wrecking the second tower was witnessed by scores of persons and many cameras were in evidence. Officials in charge of wrecking the courthouse building announced that they are making rapid progress with the work.

Fire Damage Light
Albany, Ore.—Fire early yesterday inflicted damage estimated at between \$200 and \$300 at the residence formerly occupied by the J. F. Dooley family at 820 Elm street before it was subsumed by the Albany fire department.

Fire Chief Don Hayne said that the flames originated at the bottom of the wood lift in the basement and were probably due to spontaneous combustion of oil-soaked rags. The place was unoccupied and no furniture was damaged.

Memorial Services Given Rev. Norsue

Watanabe all gave short sketches of work accomplished in the organization started by the deceased pastor. M. Hashimoto, superintendent of the Sunday school, during the first years of the church, read a biographical sketch of the son of Rev. Norsue following in his father's footsteps and is studying to be a minister at Kobe university, Japan. Rev. Norsue gave a short talk paying tribute to the deceased.
