Census Shows Linn Increase In Population

Albany — Preliminary figures of the 1940 national census received here Wednesday from Mrs. Merle Stuart, Eugene, district supervisor of the census, reveal Linn county's 1940 population is 30,465 as compared to 24,700 in 1930. This is a rise of 5,765 persons or a gain of 23.34 per cent. The preliminary figures also show the number of farms to be 3,339 as compared with 3,089 on April 1, 1930.

Local Men Employed

Albany—Excepting for two men, labor to be employed in construction of concrete foundation work for the new Albany plywood manufacturing plant will be employed locally. Roy McAllister, who will supervise the project for a concrete construction company of Portland, which has the contract for this work.

In making the announcement McAllister was conforming with the policy of Herbert Malarky and of Ray Hansen, chief engineer for the Malarky & Autzen company, who have stated that they will employ local labor as far as possible not only after the plant has started operating but during its construction.

Modern Barn Plans Drawn

Silverton—One of the most outstanding programs of farm building construction for the Silverton community, recently is on the 300-acre ranch of Klein Brothers, Fred, Sam and Charles, four miles from Silverton on the Meridian road, reported completed with Hugh Range, local architect, in charge of plans.

An all metal over-head granary, capacity of 10,000 bushels of small grain storage, modern in every respect, the type new to the northwest, is finished and ready for the products of the coming harvest season. An up-to-date elevator system, electrically operated, is installed. The building is 24 x 30 feet with 20-foot walls. The lower floor is equipped as a chopper room for feed mixers and sacker spouts. The granary is for all-year-round storage of grain.

Klein Brothers have one of the most extensive dairy businesses in Marion county and recently rebuilt their barns installing new equipment for producing grade "A" milk.

Another Silverton man, Art Gottemberg, is doing the paint job of buildings on the Klein Brothers acreage.

Youngster Drowns In Molalla River

The youngster, who had been playing around in the water with a group of other youngsters, disappeared and those on the banks of the stream were unable to say how long he was missing before an alarm was sounded.
