

Cooked Beans Feature of Stayton July Festival

Three-Day Affair Full of Events Being Arranged

Stayton — The general committee of the Stayton Bean Festival and all chairman of sub-committees met Wednesday evening and completed plans for the festival which will be held in Stayton July 18, 19 and 20.

Mr. and Mrs. Larry Goss will serve on the general committee to represent the West Stayton area, according to W. A. Weddle, chairman of that committee. Goss stated that the early beans are well in bloom and will be ready to process about the 10th of July. Free fresh green cooked beans will be served from a large bean can during the festival, and as an advertising feature this serving can will be decorated with all of the labels used on the various grades and packs of beans from this area.

The industrial parade will be held Thursday evening at 6:30 o'clock, including floats, bands, marching units, Salem whistlers, and many more entries. Friday evening at 6:30 o'clock a pet parade will be staged, with a large number of entries all ready in and many more are expected. Cash awards will be given for the best entries in both parades.

A three-mile bicycle race and water fights are more of the features of the festival. The Brownings carnival will be another big attraction and it will be located on the city property at the west end of Water street. The streets in that area will be roped off. The main part of the celebration will also be held in that part of town.

L. H. Wright, president of the Chamber of Commerce, will arrange for a caravan to go through the bean patches during the festival. The proceeds from this affair will go toward a building fund and is being sponsored by the Lions club, all civic and fraternal organizations in Stayton.

Linn Court House Discloses Relics

Albany—Relics of days long gone by were found in the old cornerstone of the old Linn county courthouse, roughly used by time, however, they still bore news of the past, it was found when they were exhumed Tuesday. The documents had endured for 75 years.

The messages from olden days reposed in the cornerstone of the now partially wrecked structure, and are destined once more to function as historical records, this time in a more secure and durable receptacle.

The oldest of the relics were placed in a column of the original courthouse, built in 1865. Curiously these papers are at least as well preserved as were those deposited when the building was remodeled in 1899.

Of the 1825 residue, newspapers, listings of public officials then in office, and a few old coins and tokens were preserved.

The pioneer newspaper thus handed down is No. 1, Volume of the Albany Journal, dated March 12, 1864, and published by Hugh George, editor.

Inscriptions reveal that Linn county's officers in 1865 were: J. C. Powell, county judge; James P. Hogue and James H. Johnson, commissioners; James Elkins, county clerk; O. W. Richardson, sheriff; Joseph Nixon, treasurer, and S. G. Irvine, county school superintendent.

County Judge J. J. Barrett yesterday said that the replacement of the cornerstone will be a part of the dedicatory ceremony here July 3.

In the new book, which will be hermetically sealed, will be placed contemporary records, documents and newspapers, Judge Barrett said.

Second Rodent Control District Will Be Formed

Lebanon — Success of the Lebanon rodent control district organized a year ago has inspired steps toward formation of a second district in Linn county. The proposed new district, comprising 25,000 acres, embraces roughly the entire South Santiam river bottom area running from Lebanon to Jefferson on either side of the river.

Organization of the district had reached the stage this week where the sponsors were about prepared to apply for a WPA project, which would work the district in fall and spring, beginning, if possible, this coming fall. If the project is granted, the sponsors will pay for poison and tools only. Assistance has also been promised by the U. S. biological survey.

The county court has verbally agreed to declare the district, an action expected to take place when the sponsors and County Agent Floyd Mullen have assembled all information in final form.

According to preliminary estimates, the cost per acre to members, which will number approximately 500, will be not more than 5 cents provided federal assistance is forthcoming, and around 25 cents per acre without federal assistance.

The sponsors' committee consists of F. S. Folsom, chairman, P. L. Miller, Clarence Cox, D. W. Porter, Fred Perry, L. D. Gorman, Ben Gooch and Alfred Wendley.
