

Lebanon Noses Are Counted; 2768 in Census

Lebanon—Lebanon's official 1940 census, as turned in district headquarters by local enumerators, is 2768, it was announced here. The announcement was simultaneous with receipt of a report from Merle C. Stuart, area supervisor, showing the population 2717 as of April 1. The latter report is preliminary and subject to correction, it was advised.

Either of the two figures represents a big gain in population this last decade. In 1930, population was officially listed at 1831. The percentage of increase is close to 50 per cent, 49.54 per cent to be exact, if the 2768 total is accepted.

Enumerators reported the new figure would be even greater if the census had been undertaken a few weeks later. Many new families established their homes here during the count and had already been enumerated elsewhere, they said. One enumerator believed that 100 new residents could not be included in the local census for this season, and stated there were but a few who had moved from this city alone.
