

School Board At Lebanon Approves Plans

Lebanon—In a special meeting, the Lebanon school board approved the plans and specifications of C. N. Freeman, Portland architect, for the addition to the Queen Anne elementary school, and ordered advertisement for bids which will be opened at 8 p.m. Wednesday, July 17, in the high school building.

The plans call for an addition consisting of five rooms, but if a unit of this size cannot be built with the \$10,000 voted for the project, a smaller unit will be erected.

Contractors may obtain copies of the plans upon payment of a deposit either to J. E. Estep, board clerk, or to Freeman's office in Portland.

The board elected two new teachers, both men. Lawrence Page, a 1940 graduate of Oregon State college, will teach secretarial science and social science, and will also assist in the intramural and high school athletic programs. He was exceptionally active in intramural sports at the college, working with Ralph Coleman. His home is in Burns.

Leo Blodgett was named a sixth grade teacher at Queen Anne. A graduate this spring of Oregon College of Education at Monmouth, he will also take over playground supervision and physical education classes, activities which to this point have been under charge of the principal, Ernest Caldwell. Blodgett's home is Albany.

Keizer Community Congratulates McNary

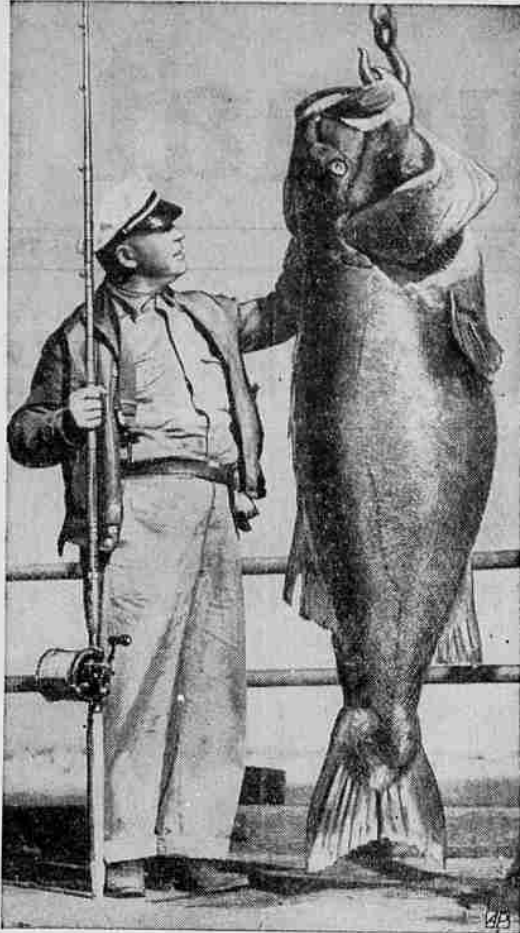
Keizer—The Keizer community club has sent a message of congratulation to United States Senator Charles L. McNary upon his nomination as vice-presidential candidate.
