

Green Pastures Not Far Away, Speaker Says

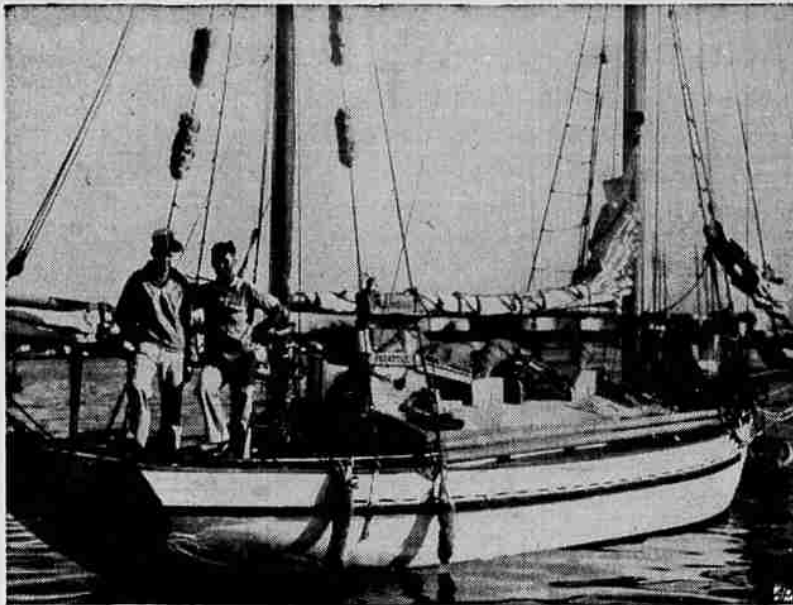

Navy Lets Contracts For 45 More Warships

Washington, July 1 (AP)—The navy today ordered construction of 45 more warships, to cost a total of approximately \$500,000,000. The largest single contract-letting in navy department history, the construction was assigned by Lewis Compton, acting secretary, within two hours after the White House had announced that President Roosevelt had signed legislation to speed up the defense program.

Officials estimated that this legislation, enabling the navy to negotiate contracts without competitive bidding, would result in savings of \$16,000,000 to \$17,000,000—the cost of a cruiser.

Included in the construction ordered were 11 cruisers, 20 destroyers, 13 submarines, and one large sea-plane tender. These will total 193,000 tons. Cost of the 45 vessels, not including armament and propelling machinery for submarines, was estimated at \$414,000,000. Officials estimated that armament and the submarine propelling machinery would bring this to more than half a billion.

One of the provisions of the speed-up law permits advance payment to contractors of 30 per cent of the contract total.

Under the law, which is to remain in effect for three years, the president in times of national emergency may increase weekly working hours in shipyards above 48, employees to receive not less than time and one-half for overtime, and thereby cut the completion time of ships by an anticipated 20 per cent.

Also the secretary of the navy may negotiate contracts for construction of naval vessels or aircraft, equipment and machine tools, without competition to save time otherwise consumed in advertising for bids.

West Salem Alarmed By Traffic Deaths

West Salem, July 1—Two deaths resulting from car accidents on Edgewater street during the month of June caused much comment on the streets here Monday morning and it is probable that a petition will be presented to the city council at the regular meeting this evening urging appointment of a day patrolman to assist the night traffic officer who is usually on duty only 16 hours and can't be expected to do a 24-hour patrol.

The death of Willis Lester Guy, 609 Mill street, Dallas, who died at a Salem hospital about 6 o'clock Monday morning as a result of a collision of his motorcycle with a Ford sedan driven by Loyal Aaron Whitney, route 1, Dallas, Sunday evening at 8 o'clock at Sloper's corner, Edgewater and McNary streets, is the second death on this highway in June.

About four weeks ago John Hall was struck by a car as he crossed Edgewater and Kingswood avenue, in front of the city hall with injuries proving fatal some days later. In the accident Sunday night Jasper Harder of 519 Church street, Dallas, was riding on the motorcycle with Guy and is now in the hospital with a compound fracture of the right leg.

There is an ordinance in effect in the city, limiting the speed of cars within a certain business zone on Edgewater street to 20 miles an hour, according to an official at the city hall.

One taxpayer complained Monday that since the state highway commission provided for three lanes for travel on Edgewater street, there has been an added incentive for more speed by motorists, though it was explained by the taxpayer that at both ends of the city limits east and west there are only two lanes which serves to curb the speeders.

Other taxpayers and citizens contend that by putting on a day patrolman his salary could be paid practically from fines imposed on traffic violators.

Olson and some of his party returned to Benbow, near the northern California coast, to rest several days. Others went to Sacramento.

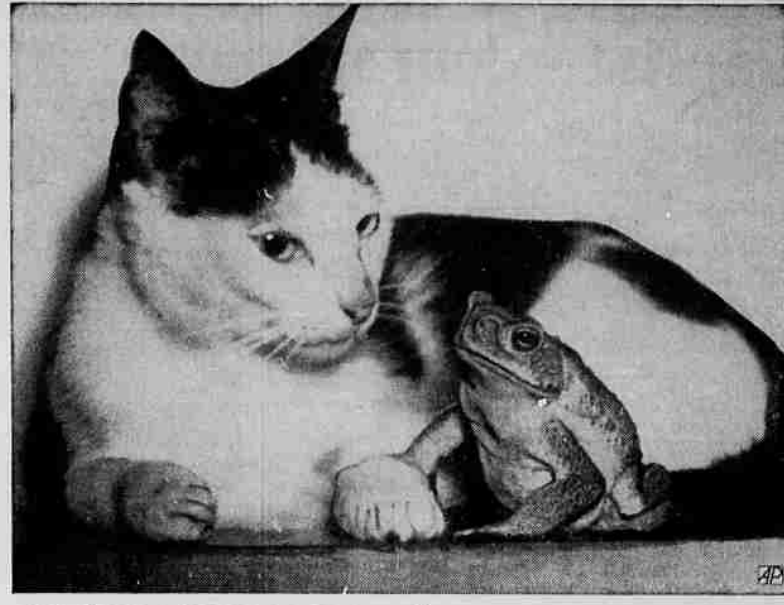
