

Chamberlain Pledges Fight To the Finish

London, July 1 (AP)—Steadily intensifying bombing raids by the British and German air forces, and a speech by former Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain promising a house-to-house fight if necessary against German invasion, indicated today that the Nazi blitzkrieg against Britain was near.

German planes dropped high explosive and incendiary bombs on England, Scotland and Wales during the night, and the air ministry announced that the Royal Air Force had made further extensive raids on German bases in France, Holland and Germany.

Chamberlain's radio speech yesterday could have been more vigorous.

He said that the cabinet and the country were working in complete unity and that reports of peace negotiations merely played the Nazi game.

"We would rather go down to ruin than admit domination by the Nazis," he said. "I do not for a moment underestimate the military might which has overwhelmed the gallant French army. . . . We all know that the enemy is now free to fall upon us. No doubt the air raids which we have lately experienced are only a prelude to something more serious. For the Nazis are staking everything upon the change of winning a short war. We know they even now are completing preparations for an attempt to invade this country. At any moment the attack may be launched by sea and by air."

Motorist Killed Near Lebanon

Lebanon, Ore., July 1—Clarence Nelson, 24, was killed and two companions, Charles Cammack and Alfred Butler, injured when the automobile driven by Nelson catapulted into a ditch while rounding a curve on the south Santiam highway about five miles southeast of here. All three lived in Portland and were members of a federal river project survey. They were returning to camp near here after spending Saturday evening with friends at Crawfordsville. Cammack received broken ribs and possible internal injuries. He is in the hospital here. Butler's injuries are not serious.

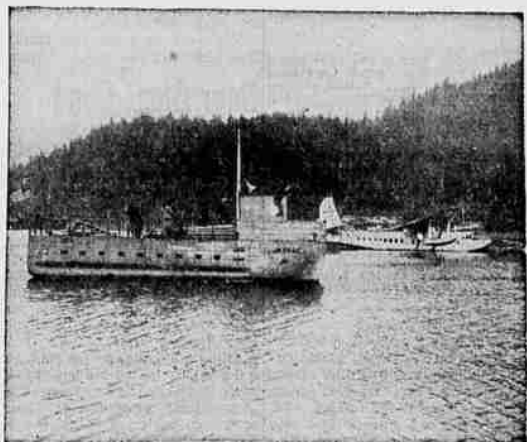

Fresno, Calif., July 1 (AP)—Raymond F. Walter, 67, chief engineer of the federal bureau of reclamation in the far western states, died at a hospital here yesterday after an illness of several months.

Walter directed construction of the Boulder dam, Grand Coulee dam and some 20 other reclamation and power projects. He was in California from his Denver headquarters, inspecting units of the Central valley project.

He came to Fresno three weeks ago, and was visiting a son, Doland E. Walter, an engineer on the

Priant dam project.

"It was heading over the bed to pick up the baby," Mrs. Daisy Earley, the neighbor said, "when the rocket shot into the room. I don't know whether it actually hit her not. All I could see was flames on her right side and around her ear. I beat out the flames with my hands and a cloth."

Today, Yvonne tossed on a bed

of pain in King county hospital, her little hands tied down to keep her from tearing the bandages off her seared flesh.

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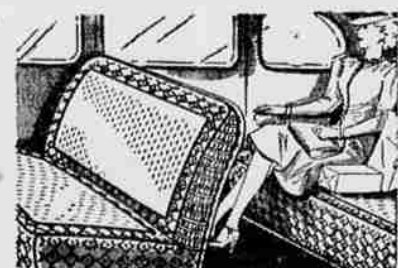
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
