

Stayton Street Oiling Program Bonds Approved

Stayton—The street oiling bonds in the amount of \$13,000 were sold to the state bond commission by the council, the same having entered the high bid of \$101.06 per ton of 2 1/2 percent per annum. This was one of several bids made and the bidding was very close. The bonds will be issued as of July 15 to run for 13 years, and be redeemed serially at the rate of \$1000 per year, commencing in 1941.

The low bid for the street oiling was entered by R. O. Dali and Warren Bros., Inc., of Portland, the figure being \$4604.00 for approximately 31,000 square yards of oiling work. This figure did not include the work of preparing the street base which is to be done by the town, and likewise all gravel is to be furnished by the town.

The pavement will be 20 feet in width, but any individual may have an additional width by paying for the same at the regular cost price. In view of the favorable bid, it is expected that about all of the more traveled streets will be improved.

In order to maintain equal water pressure in town, the council provided alternate use for irrigation purposes, the residents having odd house numbers to be permitted to irrigate on odd numbered days, and those with even house numbers to irrigate on even numbered days.

The council acted to permit the Lions club to close Water and Second streets during the carnival to be held July 16 to 20, and also allowed the use of vacant city property for the entertainment.

Park Assured Sufficient Water

Dallas—The Dallas city council held a regular meeting Monday evening in the council room in city hall at which time the park committee reported a sufficient water supply for keeping the park grass green was being supplied through a series of pipes laid throughout the park leading from the dam. A pumping plant is being installed to force the water through the pipes.

A report from the Dallas water commission was given in which it was said that a cash balance was on hand amounting to \$3685.04 and the bonds were now paid down to \$31,000 from the original issue of \$120,000.

Good Business Signs are Read; Blazes Alarm

Lebanon—Further evidence of good business conditions in this territory were signified Tuesday in the report of Postmaster Merrill Smith, showing receipts for the first six months of the year exceeded by nearly \$1000 any previous gross for this period.

This year's volume to date is \$9100, \$968 greater than the volume for the corresponding period in 1938 when the previous first six months' high was marked up, and is substantially more than half of last year's record 12-month gross of \$17,433.

June business amounted to \$1398, 76, an 80 increase over June, 1939 but a reduction of \$188 under the May, 1940 figure. June was the sixth consecutive month that business has exceeded by a considerable margin the corresponding month last year.

Sales, month by month, were: January, \$1531; February, \$1394; March, \$1624; April, \$1624; May, \$1587; June, \$1399.
