

Sewer Contract Given Herder Upon Low Bid

Lebanon — The lowest of three bidders, Henry Den Herder, was awarded by the city council Tuesday night, the contract to lay a new sewer on River street to East Oak, and on Oak to Eddie street. Den Herder's bid was \$725. Other bidders and their bids were: Ed Kellenberger, \$769.70, and Lee Scott, \$797.10.

A petition of property owners asking improvement of B street between Fifth and Seventh streets was approved, and the improvement ordered. The city will stand the expense of grading, and the property owners will be charged with the cost of the gravel.

Orville Etter, legal consultant for the League of Oregon Cities, advised the council the codification of this city's ordinances is about completed and the project should be concluded in about a month.

The matter of whether signs designating names of streets at intersections where such signs are now lacking was turned over to the street committee with power to act.

Stanley Stewart, manager of the local office of the Mountain States Power company, agreed to make tests approximately every two weeks to determine purity of water in the city's swimming hole on the river.

It is said by hospital authorities, Comack received a broken rib and multiple bruises in the early morning crash that took the life of the driver, Clarence Nelson, 24, of Portland. Alfred Butler, also 24, and of Portland, was not injured to any degree. All of the men were with a crew making surveys for the Willamette Valley flood control project.
