RADIO Day by Day

Time is Eastern Standard—Daylight Time

New York, July 6 (AP)—Broadcasts on a half-hour basis, a series of "The Battle of Britain" is coming to the air. The program will be broadcast on the hour Monday night time after next week of the Cecil B. DeMille radio theater which goes on vacation.

The series will contain new program ideas. On six nights there will be two half-hour productions, one from New York and the other from Hollywood. On two nights each city will have an hour long program.

To start, on July 15 New York will present "The Battle of Britain" or symphony vs. music. Hollywood will offer "The American Theatre" version of "The Gentleman from Indiana."

Chiang Kai-Shek Issues Warning

Chungking, July 6 (AP)—Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek warned friendly powers today against indifference toward "Japanese threats" to French Indo-China, British Burma and The Netherlands East Indies.

In a statement issued on the third anniversary of the outbreak of the Chinese-Japanese war, Chiang reiterated his determination to continue the struggle against Japan whatever other nations do, but appealed to America and to Soviet Russia for assistance.

Plan to Dethrone King Haakon

Stockholm, July 6 (AP)—A movement was reported under way in Norway today to form some sort of permanent government under German occupation to replace the regime of King Haakon VII, now a refugee in England.

The Oslo correspondent of the Stockholm newspaper Aftens Nyheter reported that a large group of leading Norwegians are convinced that the country cannot go on indefinitely on the present basis, with responsible heads of the government in exile and civil functions in the hands of a temporary administrative council.

The Norwegians were represented as feeling that "easier conditions" might result if a new and permanent government were organized to work with the German military. Spokesmen were said to have pointed to the situation in Denmark which they said "is not disturbed under German occupation."

(The Danish government offered no resistance to the German invasion April 9 and has continued to administer domestic affairs approximately as usual.)

The reports from Oslo assumed added importance in view of a Swedish announcement yesterday that restrictions on railway transport facilities to Norway had been lifted because Sweden feels that the end of the war there means a return to more normal times.

French Warplanes Raid Gibraltar

Berlin, July 6 (AP)—The German wireless night broadcast a dispatch from Vichy saying that two squadrons of French naval planes had attacked the British base at Gibraltar, hitting British warships there.

The German wireless quoted a dispatch of the official German news agency, which said that French planes which had been disarmed under the armistice agreement were granted permission to re-arm and make the attack on their former allies.

The raid was announced in a French communiqué, according to the dispatch, and read over the French radio.

Government Forbids Strike In Aluminum

Pittsburgh, July 6 (AP)—Anxious to prevent any delay in the defense program, the federal government today took a stern hand in a deadlocked wage dispute threatening a strike in the aluminum industry—vital to airplane manufacture.

In a patriotic appeal to the CIO Aluminum Workers union to consider the nation's interests, Dr. John R. Steelman, chief conciliator of the labor department, asked that strike action be withheld, and summoned officials of the union and the Aluminum Company of America to Washington to continue negotiations Monday.

Speaking "on behalf of the government," Steelman told the union that "under the circumstances, no other alternative is available, and both parties are expected to comply."

N. A. Zonarich, international president of the union, and I. W. Wilson, vice president of the company, gave quick assurance they would.

The \$250,000,000 corporation, sole producer of aluminum in the United States, is handling a number of government orders.

Steelman made his request after attending two conferences on the union's demand for a 10-cents-an-hour wage increase for 15,000 employees at five of the company's plants.

Warships Sent To Martinique

Washington, July 6 (AP)—The United States was believed today to have dispatched a number of neutrality patrol warships to the general vicinity of French Martinique in the Caribbean to investigate reports that a French naval detachment there is awaiting a British ultimatum.

The American vessels—5 destroyers—were said to have been dispatched from the Virgin Islands to observe the Martinique situation first hand. Reports from St. Thomas, Virgin Islands, said that the ships left yesterday for an unknown destination. St. Thomas is about a day's run from Martinique.

While most officials declined to comment on the movement of the destroyers, one authoritative source said they "are not bound for the Panama canal." He added, however, that if the ships actually reach the Martinique area they will act strictly as observers. One of their functions would be to warn American shipping in the vicinity if hostilities developed between the French and British.

The battleships New York and Texas, which sailed out of St. Thomas with the destroyers, were said to be headed in another direction. The two ships are carrying U. S. naval academy midshipmen on their annual cruise and, it was believed, would not enter any potential danger areas.

Bomb Grounded French Cruiser

London, July 6 (AP)—British warplanes scored six hits on the grounded French battleship Dunkerque in an attack today, the admiralty announced. The 26,500-ton warship was damaged and driven ashore in the battle of Oran Wednesday.

Two British aircraft failed to return from the attack by naval planes, the admiralty acknowledged.

As a result of the British naval action against units of the French navy at Oran on July 3, the French battle cruiser Dunkerque was damaged and driven ashore. (Jane's) fighting ships lists the Dunkerque as a battleship.

"The extent of the damage to this ship is not known, but it was considered essential that the ship should be in no condition to take part in the war in case she should fall under enemy control."

"After the engagement on July 3, (French) Admiral Gensoul, commanding French forces at Oran, signalled that his warships were hors de combat, and that he was ordering the personnel to evacuate the ships."

"In view of this statement by the French commander, it was not considered necessary to give warning before carrying out further operations against the Dunkerque."

"The French battle cruiser was attacked this morning by aircraft of the fleet air arm. Six hits were obtained on the Dunkerque. Two of our aircraft failed to return."

Bill to Control Nazis and Reds

Washington, July 6 (AP)—A bill to require the German American Bund, the communist party and similar organizations to report their activities to the attorney general got a "clear track" signal in the senate today as congressional leaders were rounding out a program tightening restrictions on aliens.

Chairman Connally (D-Tex.) announced that a senate judiciary subcommittee would call G. Wilhelm Kunze, New York Bund leader, when it begins hearings Monday on a house measure requiring registration of political organizations substantially controlled or directed by a foreign power.

Connally said that other Bund leaders probably would be called, as would proponents of the bill. He predicted favorable action by the subcommittee and said that early senate consideration would be sought.

House members were told during debate on the measure that activities of the German-American Bund and the communist party would fall within its scope.

The senate has ready for consideration another house bill providing for deportation of aliens who advocate changes in the American form of government. This measure, approved by the immigration committee, would put "teeth" into existing deportation laws.

Totalitarians Use Boy Scout Ideas

San Francisco, July 6 (AP)—Youth movements in totalitarian nations have borrowed ideas freely from the American Boy Scout handbook, but the scout movement itself cannot exist under totalitarianism, James E. West, chief scout executive of the Boy Scouts of America, said Friday.

West, arriving here for celebration of "Boy Scout day" at the San Francisco World's fair, pointed out the value of scout training as a pre-military education.

Such features as handicraft instruction, self-reliance in camping, and woodcraft were taken directly from scout training handbooks by organized youth in Germany, Italy and Russia—"where scouting is banned," West said.

Oil From Iraq Barred to Enemies

London, July 6 (AP)—Authoritative circles said Friday that action was taken three weeks ago to prevent any of the valuable oil supplies in the Mosul oil fields in Iraq from falling into German or Italian hands.

It was said here that the passage of oil through the pipe line connecting Mosul wells with Tripoli in the French mandated territory of Syria has been "interrupted" for the past three weeks.

The pipe line between the Mosul fields and Haifa, British-controlled port on the west coast of Palestine, was continuing to function normally.

Army to Offer Compulsory Training Plan

Washington, July 6 (AP)—Silent so far on all proposals for compulsory military training, the army now has consented to give congress its expert conclusions on 20 years of study of peacetime conscription.

Informed that army and navy spokesmen would testify Tuesday, the senate military committee yesterday postponed further hearings on a bill to require registration of all men between 18 and 65 for defense training.

At the same time, on receiving assurance from the war department that thousands of Garand semi-automatic rifles could be made ready for an emergency, the committee killed a bill by Chairman Sheppard (D. Tex.), to make a second gun, the Johnson rifle, also standard equipment for the army.

Sponsors of the registration bill indicated at hearings that they proposed to give training immediately to about 3.77 per cent of the male population between 19 and 65 and to spend for the program about what the WPA costs annually.

Col. Julius Ochs Adler, general manager of the New York Times, told the committee that 2,000,000 men should be trained as soon as feasible and that an equal number should be called up over a period of years.

The 1930 census showed 40,000,000 men between 18 and 25, and the 1940 count is expected to list 53,000,000—of whom 2,000,000 would be 3.77 per cent. In 1930 there were 4,400,000 men between 18 and 21, the age group from which most trainees are expected to come.

Democrats to Meet July 15

Washington, July 6 (AP)—With the presidential election exactly four months off, democratic leaders were hustling preparations today for their party's July 15 convention amid increasing indications that President Roosevelt would break tradition and accept a third term "draft."

Republicans, too, were thinking of casting an old custom aside as their 1940 standard bearer, Wendell L. Willkie, considered plans in New York for a three-man strategy board in lieu of a single campaign director.

Willkie will come here Monday to discuss campaign plans with his running mate, Senator Charles L. McNary of Oregon.

Talk of a democratic ticket headed by President Roosevelt and Secretary of State Cordell Hull continued to overshadow speculation by a few party members that the chief executive might turn down the nomination at the last minute.

High officials based their prediction of a Roosevelt acceptance partly on the assumption that an eleven-hour declination might turn the convention into confusion from which it might be difficult to recover in the ensuing campaign.

Others mentioned besides Hull as a Roosevelt running mate include Senator Byrnes of South Carolina, Supreme Court Justice Douglas of Connecticut and Washington state, Vice President Garner, Senator Lucas of Illinois, Paul V. McNutt of Indiana, Federal Security administrator, Speaker Bankhead of Alabama, and House Leader Rayburn of Texas.

Airplane Plant On 48 Hour Basis

San Diego, Calif., July 6 (AP)—With a heavy backlog of orders for military planes for the United States and England, the Consolidated Aircraft corporation today planned to put its employees on a 6-day, 48-hour week basis.

Major Reuben H. Fleet, company president, said the new work schedule was subject to approval of customers and the union representing hourly employees. It will result in an increase of 20 per cent in production and 30 per cent in payroll.

Portland Taxes Users of Water

Portland, July 6 (AP)—The state sanitary authority said it wasn't enough but Portland commissioners approved a 10 cent assessment yesterday against water users to finance start of an anti-pollution system here.

City sewage at present empties into the Willamette and Columbia rivers.

Attempt to Blast Dupont Plant

Baton Rouge, La., July 6 (AP)—Three men carrying four sticks of dynamite were surprised as they attempted to enter the grounds of the duPont ethyl plant near Baton Rouge last night.

Sheriff Newman Dehretion said the men escaped, leaving the dynamite behind them. Searchers found evidence of fresh digging at the base of a fence around the plant. The dynamite was found just inside.

The plant is of great importance in the national defense picture. Olinen estimated one third of all tetraethyl fluid used in the highest grade gasoline consumed in this country is produced there.

French Warships Escape British

Grenoble, France, July 6 (AP)—A large battleship and a number of other French warships which escaped from the British in the Battle of Oran were reported to have arrived at Toulon today.

Word came, however, of the sinking of two other French vessels. The newspaper Le Petit Dauphin of Grenoble, reported the 26,500-ton battleship Strasbourg, five 7,000-ton cruisers of the George Legues class, and a number of other destroyers, submarines and gunboats arrived at the French naval base. The Strasbourg was said to have been damaged only slightly.

The French naval ministry announced the gunboat Rigault De Genouilly was torpedoed without warning off Algiers by an unidentified submarine yesterday afternoon. The fate of the crew was not ascertained.

The 1378-ton cruiser Foudroyer was attacked and sunk by two British cruisers after a two-hour battle off the island of Crete in the Mediterranean, the French navy minister announced.

(The German wireless said the crew of 149 was rescued after three days. The date the Foudroyer was sunk was not given, but it was reported to have been en route to a French port in execution of the terms of the armistice with Germany and Italy.)

From Vichy, the French naval ministry announced that it had advised Germany and Italy that France's naval bases in the Mediterranean would not be disarmed for the present, in order that the remainder of the French fleet could be defended against attack.

Willkie Denounces Persecution of Jews

New York, July 6 (AP)—Wendell L. Willkie said in an interview published today in the Jewish daily "The Day," that "I consider anti-Semitism in America as a possible criminal movement and every anti-Semite as a possible traitor to America."

"What man with a conscience," the republican presidential nominee was quoted, "what man who knows the suffering of Israel and what Israel has tried to accomplish and has accomplished in the march of humanity, cannot be tolerant toward Israel?"

"I am clearly asserting my position against race hatred, bigotry and Hitlerism. I long before I even thought of being a presidential candidate. I did it solely because I wanted to express my protest against Hitlerism and against all fascist persecution methods."

"If anti-Semitism should spread its roots in the United States as it has done in most of the countries of Europe, then it would definitely be a calamity for the United States."

"I am clearly asserting my position against race hatred, bigotry and Hitlerism. I long before I even thought of being a presidential candidate. I did it solely because I wanted to express my protest against Hitlerism and against all fascist persecution methods."

Youth Confesses Double Murder

Buffalo, N. Y., July 6 (AP)—Police said today that Frank Swiatek, 19, had confessed bludgeoning his 19-year old brother and his 11-year old sister to death in the same way that he killed another brother three years ago.

The bodies of Gordon and Teresa were found by police in a blood-soaked bed in the family flat last night. Frank walked into a police station to report that they were there.

Frank was paroled about a year ago from Elmira reformatory. He had been convicted of manslaughter for killing his brother Leo, 17, with an ax, on August 23, 1938.

Chief of Detective Arthur D. Britt said that he was convinced the youth is insane, and that his claim that his step-father urged him to commit the crime was "imaginary."

"When he reported the deaths last night he was calm and untroubled," Britt said. "He still shows no remorse and I'm convinced that he is insane."

Dutch Warned by Nazi Commander

Amsterdam, July 6 (AP)—The German military commander in Holland, Air Corps General Friedrich Christiansen, issued a sharp communiqué today accusing the Dutch army and population of an unloyal attitude toward the German occupation.

He said the character of British bombing attacks proved that Britain was obtaining information from the Dutch side.

The communiqué warned against any demonstration in favor of the Dutch government.

Berlin Claims Successes in Air and Sea

Berlin, July 6 (AP)—The German high command today told of sweeping air successes against British objectives on land and sea and credited a Nazi submarine with the destruction of 66,587 tons of merchant shipping.

Lieut.-Captain Gunther Prien, already hailed as one of "Hitler's heroes" for his feat at the outset of the war when he shocked the British by torpedoing the Battleship Royal Oak inside the naval base of Scapa Flow, was credited with a "record" for a single cruise by a German submarine. The communiqué reported:

"Lieut.-Capt. Prien and his submarine during a cruise against the enemy just ended have sunk a total of 66,587 tons of enemy merchant shipping space. This is the highest result of one single cruise against the enemy."

At the same time the German high command announced that air raiders had sunk a British submarine and had badly damaged another in the North Sea.

Claims were made that one "enemy" merchant ship of between 8000 and 10,000 registered tons was destroyed and two additional vessels totaling 8000 tons were damaged.
