

Reconstruction of New Plant is Assured Albany

Lilly Company To Begin Work Upon Building

Albany, Ore.—Reconstruction of a new \$50,000 Lilly Seed company plant in Albany Saturday when Captain J. E. Blain, president of the concern, announced that work on a new plant would begin here within the next few days.

Decision to rebuild here removed the possibility that Albany might lose the new industry after having it but one week before the fire completely destroyed the plant last Monday. A number of other sites for relocation of the firm were being considered, including Corvallis, but conferences with members of the Albany Chamber of Commerce industrial committee finally resulted in the company officials deciding to reconstruct their building here.

Plans for the erection of another Albany Canning company building are advancing rapidly, P. J. Burk, president, announced yesterday, the plant to be erected directly west of the Lilly project, he added.

Accident Victim Improving

Albany, Ore.—Donald Fulk, 22-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Fulk of Albany, has regained consciousness and is reported to be making good progress toward recovery from a fractured skull he received in a Fourth of July accident in which his companion, Jerome Lundie, was killed instantly. Fulk stated upon recovering consciousness in the Lebanon hospital, that Lundie was driving the car when the accident occurred, his parents reported. Meanwhile Lundie's body is at the Fisher funeral home pending word from his parents, Mr. and Mrs. P. J. Lundie, from Minneapolis, Minn.

Child Stealing Charged

Albany, Ore.—Charged with child stealing in justice court here, Sam Thrice and T. T. Dollarhide were to be brought to Albany from Bend by Sheriff Herbert Shelton, who was to take them into custody this morning.

The two are accused of transporting a 15-year old Sweet Home girl to Bend, although reports here from Bend state that Thrice and Dollarhide assert the girl claimed she was 21 years of age. All three, including the girl, are being held at Bend.

Social Worker Resigns

Albany, Ore.—Mrs. Melvin Goode, social worker in the Linn county welfare office, announced her resignation from the local commission when that group met here Friday. Her successor has not as yet been appointed. A report of the records given at Friday's meeting show that a decline of \$360.55 in the costs of public relief in Linn county during June from the May total was realized. The June cost was \$15,288.50. General assistance was the chief expense, dropping \$368.06. Four hundred and fifty six persons received cash aid, 52 of whom were single.

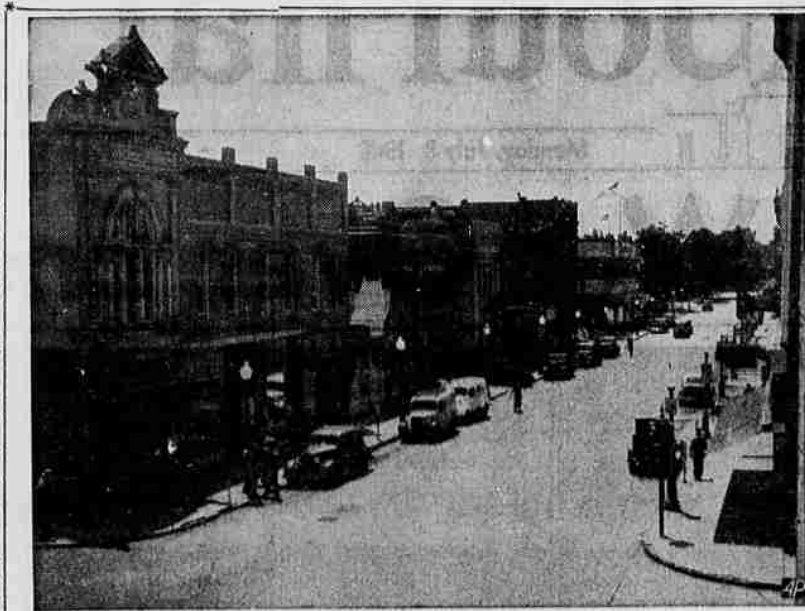

Users of Water Are Cautioned

Silverton—Elgin McCleary, water superintendent and managing engineer, is asking the water users to conserve as much as is possible in the use of water for several days.

No hours for irrigation have been designated as the users are on a meter system and formerly have been permitted to use water at any hour. McCleary is requesting the conservation in order to not have to put the users on regular hours.

Silverton gets the supply of water for the city from three wells and the Abiqua intake. The stream is the lowest in years at this time of the season; two wells are not producing as they should, and the main hope is the third well that is doing 700 gallons to the minute.

The reserve reservoir is kept full from the Abiqua.

The sinking of a fourth well is being discussed.

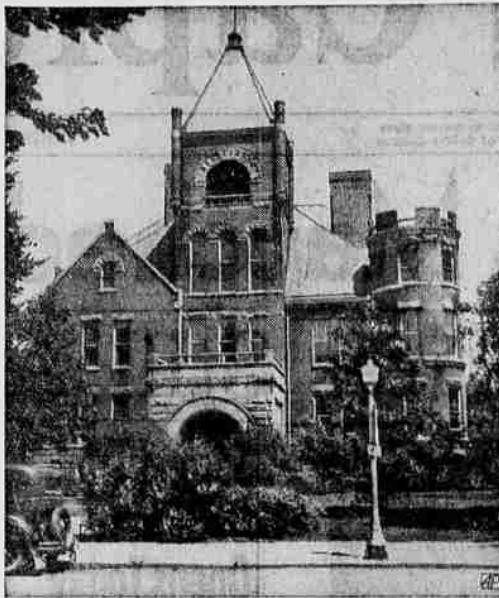

Silverton, Ore., July 8—Officers of the Columbia river division of the International Woodworkers of America, CIO, were installed Sunday afternoon by Adolph Germer, director of CIO affairs in New York and labor representative of the regional board of the old NIRA at Chicago.

Officers seated were A. F. Hartung, Vernonia, president; F. E. Gordon, Seaside, secretary; Claude Hale, Portland, vice president; William Strothers, Westport, conductor; Cecil Urie, Jewell, warden; members of the executive board, Ed Haygood, Cathlamet, Wash.; William Estep, Kalama, Wash.; Earl Harper, Willamina; Guy Haney, Seaside; John Shark, Jewell; Max Gardner, Waukena; Chet Dustin, Norvell Shurtleff, Don; Vernonia and Don Helmick, Forest Grove. Trustees are Haygood, Shurtleff and Haney.

Criticism was voiced of the state insurance act, unchanged in form since 1914, which was held to be outmoded and not fitted to present conditions.
