

Migratory Workers' Camp Is Sought by Lebanon

Federal Help Being Sought By Forum Men

Lebanon—A move to secure in this territory a temporary federal camp for migratory workers was launched Monday night when in a meeting of the Lebanon Commercial club, President Walter Scott appointed a committee of three men to investigate the proposal and report back in the August meeting.

The committee was appointed after C. B. Spencer, owner and operator of the Spencer Packing plant, declared growers lost tons and tons of fruit because of a shortage of pickers, and this shortage, he said, may be blamed on the fact there exists at present almost a total lack of satisfactory housing facilities for seasonal workers.

Spencer told the club the government must be secured a several acre tract of land on which it may drill a well and establish sanitary facilities. The camps, which would be operative from May through August, would be located on a site equally accessible to fields of Lebanon, Lacombe and Crabtree.

Spencer, L. E. Arnold and T. W. Munyan were named on the committee, which will pay a visit to the Stayton camp.

George Britton, secretary of the housing committee, reported that a house-to-house canvass indicates 25 new residences are in the process of erection or will be erected, and that this will to some degree at least help solve the housing problem existing here.

The group also discussed at length road and highway problems, and also talked over measures which might be undertaken to improve sewage disposal.

Bank Creditors Receive Final Dividend Cash

Albany—A final dividend amounting to \$35,859.30 is being paid on both commercial and savings accounts to creditors of the First National Bank of Albany, which has been in process of liquidation for the past several years. It was announced today by C. C. Bryant, receiver.

The dividend now being paid is 7.68 per cent of the total amount of claims. Previous to the present payment 62 per cent had been paid to claimants, with this dividend bringing the total amount paid out to 69.68 per cent or \$25,327.41.

Mr. Bryant was appointed receiver of the defunct First National bank of Albany on August 16, 1933. The bank had been operating on a restricted basis from March 1, 1933, until June 29, 1933. At the latter date Mr. Bryant said, a conservator was in charge of the affairs of liquidating the bank until the appointment of Mr. Bryant as receiver.

The present dividend is being paid on proved claims totaling \$461,808.95 and includes a total of 1,487 proved claims.

Mr. Bryant stated that deposit liability on March 1, 1933, of \$815,958.58 consisted of unsecured liabilities of \$508,556.37, secured liabilities of \$270,825.57 and additional liabilities established since suspension of \$36,576.64.

It was also stated by Receiver Bryant that small claims which have never been proved amount to \$4,365.62. However, these claims will not be paid as six years have passed and it is now too late to prove any claim for the above amount.

Profits during receivership, Mr. Bryant reported, are on interest premiums and rents and total \$56,733.84 above the assets shown on the books.

Mr. Bryant has liquidated banks in Springfield and Silverton and is now liquidating the First National bank in Salem, which will also be closed shortly.

New Working Hours For Dallas Crew

Dallas—Mill whistles were blowing at odd hours Monday when a new system of working hours was put into effect. Workers instead of going to work at 8:00 o'clock went to work at 7:30 a. m., which necessitated the blowing of the whistle then instead of the usual 8:00. The whistle blew again at 11:30 to signify the noon hour, and so forth throughout the day.

The reason for the change in hours is to provide better electrical service for the housewife. The power from the local power plant is utilized at the mill and when the mill is down, that power is transferred to the lines of the Mountain States Power company which creates better service to the home during the noon hour. The mill workers' wives will prepare the noon meals at an earlier hour while the wives of the business men will prepare their meals at the usual time, thus distributing the power over a longer period of time and preventing using such a great amount at one time as heretofore.
