

Waterworks Bid Accepted by Scio Councilmen

Scio — City of Scio offers were augmented in the sum of \$375 at the July meeting of the council. That was the amount offered by Ed Kellenberger of Lebanon for portions of used waterworks equipment no longer needed by the city.

Kellenberger's remittance was for only a 15 horse power pump and the wiring attached, \$150, and a Kimball Grogh pump and column, \$225. The city's call for sealed bids included several other items.

R. J. Strasser, Scio, submitted a bid of \$144 for material desired. Call for bids was prospective buyers right to include all or any part of the material sought to be sold. Right also was reserved by the council to reject any or all bids.

A 6000-gallon galvanized reservoir, not now used by the city, together with steel tower and pipe, and several other items were included in the sale proposal. Council has placed a price of \$200 on the reservoir and appurtenances. Unless satisfactory offer is received, these are to be retained for use in emergencies, it was agreed.

Application of Floyd Johnson of Scio for pool and card table license, having been granted June 19, 1940, by J. A. Withers, president of the council, during recess of the body and in the absence of Mayor Schunk from the city, was ratified by the council.

License fee of \$10 a year for one pool table and \$10 for two card tables was fixed by the council. Johnson paid for six months. The former Fred Jones, adjoining the Scio Confectionery on the south, is the site of the pool and card hall.

The Scio Confectionery (Sweeney & Pank, formerly Sweeney & Jones) purchased the Jones property soon after Johnson started his pool and card business, but he was allowed three months to secure other quarters.

Check for \$6.77 was received from Mountain States Power company, two per cent on billing within the city limits for the month of May, 1940. Rebates totaling approximately \$100 a year have been received from the company for some time.

Claims against the city were allowed as follows: Mountain States Power company, light \$40.45, power \$108.10, total \$148.55. J. P. Oupor, marshal, water superintendent, labor, etc., \$27.52. Joe Lytle, recorder, \$5.00. R. M. Cain, \$1.15. Scio Tribune, advertising waterworks equipment for sale, \$2.50.

Albany—Construction of the new building which will house the Albany plant of the Charles H. Lilly seed cleaning plant and warehouse will start immediately, it was announced Wednesday by J. D.
