GOOD TASTE TODAY

The distinction that must be made between conventional requirements of good usage and what we may choose to do in our own houses, is illustrated in a letter which asks if it is also wrong to serve salad on a separate plate with meat if vegetables are not included. This letter says further, "It is very hard to go without vegetables, because some of us do not like meat without vegetables."

While one of us likes to eat the salad and the meat together:

To this answer is that hot vegetables eaten at the same time as salad (according to formal usage) is almost as wrong as serving cream soup and ice cream at the same time. Some one might like this and in her own house there is no reason why she may not have what she or her family likes. I cite this example merely to make my point, knowing very well of course that more people like salad and vegetables than could possibly like the soup and ice cream combination. I must of course repeat that when salad is served with meat it correctly takes the place of vegetables. Otherwise, it should be served as a separate course.

But I must also add that if in a house of limited service, it is easier to prepare the salad on individual plates ahead of time and to put these at each place at table, to be eaten when each one prefers, this is a compromise that (even though not correct) might in such cases be quite sensible to make.

Who Eats First? Dear Mrs. Post: At a very big public dinner where there is a speakers' table and smaller tables, when does a guest begin eating? Must the people at the small tables wait for some one at the speakers' table—perhaps the chairman—to begin eating, or how is this determined? At an ordinary dinner I know of course that people would

The Americans like stuffing for poultry, meat and vegetables. We like the flavor and the texture and also like the fact that we can often make meat go further by using stuffing with it. In summer there are tomatoes, peppers and eggplant and also squash which lend themselves so well for filling with a highly seasoned crumb mixture. This is where any bit of leftover meat comes in particularly well.

The basic recipe for poultry stuffing may be varied in any way you like and cut down in measurement when you are stuffing vegetables. Soft bread crumbs are often used as the foundation. Cracker crumbs, boiled rice, or corned crumbs replace the soft bread crumbs in some recipes. Dry stuffings are general favorites, but if you prefer a moist stuffing you may add water, stock, tomato juice, cream or milk to any of the following recipes. You will be almost certain to vary the seasonings to suit your own taste.

The amount of stuffing which you will need will vary with the size and shape of the fowl, meat, fish or vegetable you have chosen. The general allowance is 1 cup stuffing for each pound of poultry and 1/2 cup stuffing for each pound of fish. The allowance for vegetables will vary with the products.

Poultry Stuffing
4 cups soft bread crumbs
4 cups soft bread crumbs
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1/2 cup poultry seasoning, or sage
Melt butter, add onion, and cook over medium heat 4 minutes, until onion is yellow but not brown. Add bread crumbs which have been mixed with seasonings. Cook 2 minutes, stirring constantly. Yield: about 4 cups of stuffing, enough for a 4-pound bird. Note: If a moist stuffing is desired, add stock, water, or slightly beaten egg after stuffing has cooked 2 minutes.

Savory Stuffing
Cook 2 tablespoons of chopped green pepper and 1/4 cup chopped celery with the onions. Add 1 tablespoon chile sauce after stuffing has cooked 2 minutes.

Farsie Stuffing
Add 1/2 cup chopped parsley with the bread crumbs.

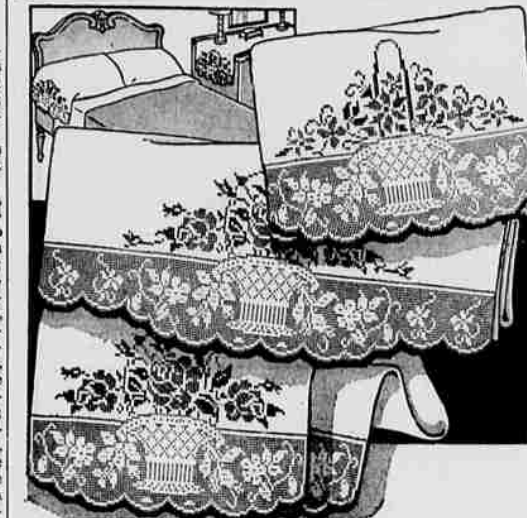
Cornbread Stuffing
Substitute 2 cups dry cornbread crumbs for 2 cups soft bread crumbs.

Fruit Stuffing
1/2 cup butter
3 strips bacon
2 tablespoons chopped onion
1 cup soft bread crumbs
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup chopped apple
3 cups chopped cooked prunes

Mince bacon and cook in frying pan over medium heat until almost crisp. Add onion and cook 3 minutes. Mix bread crumbs with salt, apple and prunes. Stir in onion and bacon and mix well. If stuffing is too dry, use water in which prunes were cooked. Use for stuffing duck or pork. Yield: about 5 cups.
