

# Stayton in Festive Mood as Santiam Festival Opens

## Free Serving Santiam Beans Starts Friday

Stayton—All of Stayton is in a festive mood with the opening of the first Annual Santiam Bean Festival. The Browning Carnival concessions are open and will continue through Saturday at their location on Second and Water streets.

One of the features of the celebration will be the serving of free beans from the "largest bean can in the world," which is being sponsored by the Stayton Canning company. Beans will be served Friday and Saturday evening on the carnival grounds from 6 to 7 o'clock. This large bean can will be decorated with Santiam labels. These beans are grown and packed in this vicinity.

Thursday evening a street dance will be held on Second street in front of the Women's club house, with Jimmy Whitmore orchestra of Portland furnishing the music. Dances will be held Friday and Saturday night also. Band concerts under the direction of J. F. Lau will be held Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights.

Friday afternoon at 3 o'clock the qualifying bicycle race will be held and the winners of the first ten places will be eligible to enter the final three mile race on Saturday. The race Friday will consist of one mile. The race Saturday will start at the "B" turn between Sublimity and Aumsville on the new oil road, then onto the cut north of town and then into the city center. This portion of the highway will be closed and patrolled by state police, firemen and Boy Scouts during the race.

To date 20 have registered and more are expected according to Leonard Thoma, chairman of this committee. Thoma states that anyone wishing to enter this race must do so before 6 o'clock Thursday evening. The best time reported for those who pedaled the route so far was 10 1/2 minutes. Ed. Roesser, Sublimity's entry, is being heavily backed by his home folk. First prize will be \$5 and the second \$2.50.

In addition each contestant finishing will receive an award. Friday at 7:30 o'clock the industrial parade will start, which will include floats, bands, marching units and many more entries. The parade will form on Second and Ida streets, with Grant Murphy in charge. Cash awards will be presented to the prize winning entries.

The pet parade will be held Saturday evening at 7:30 o'clock, which has been divided into five divisions, bicycle, tricycle, comic, costume and pets. One dollar first prize and 50 cents second prize will be awarded to each division and a sweepstakes award of \$250. Kention Thompson, chairman of the pet parade, announces that about 50 have been entered in the parade and if anyone else wishes to enter he may do so by getting a touch with Thompson.

Following the pet parade a junior water fight will be staged, with Captain Billy Freese and his Smoke Eaters vs. Captain George Meyers and his Cinder Daddies. This act promises to be very exciting. This will be followed by water fight between the Sublimity Fire department and the Stayton Fire department, with Chief Byron of Solo, Chief Jensen of Turner and Chief Wells of Aumsville as the judges. The fight will be staged on Ida street near the First National bank, and will consist of two ten minute periods.

Stayton Troop 50 of the Boy Scouts will have a first aid tent on the carnival grounds during the celebration, with a qualified first aid scout in charge at all times. A number of local firemen have been deputized and will take charge of the policing problem, along with city police and state officers.

Members of the Stayton Unit No. 88, The American Legion auxiliary will have a Red Cross booth and sell Red Cross tags Friday evening. The proceeds of this celebration will go toward a community building fund. The festival is being sponsored by all civic and fraternal organizations, with H. J. Rowe as general chairman.

The men investigated, found out that the team played Silverton an exhibition game that night, the players got their steak and what-have-you, and the Meyerses and Chases decided to stay right here and take what comes, for they have had some 12 or 14 years' experience in the restaurant business and are completely sold on the natural scenery of the valley, conceding that they could "take" the facial decorations.

## Mill City Merchant Checks Store Loss

Mill City—In what could easily have been a very serious accident here Sunday evening, Arthur Rickerts, who was recently released from the CCC camp, crashed his automobile through the doorway and front of the Red and White store. The car, a 1929 Chevrolet, splintered half of the double door, miraculously leaving the huge pane of glass intact, tore loose an iron post in the entrance way, plowed through a large display window, and came to rest atop a large, plate-glass showcase of men's furnishings.

## Cash Balance Of City Funds Has Interest

Lebanon—Total receipts in the general fund during the first six months of the year amounted to \$19,853, compared to disbursements of \$11,747, according to the semi-annual report of City Recorder George Randle. Total receipts in all funds amounted to \$21,931.

Tax payments accounted for \$17,726 of general fund receipts, and \$10,955 was represented in license fees and franchises, the report recited.

An additional disbursement was transfer of \$4440 for refunding principal and interest on a \$4000 fire equipment bond due July 1. This leaves the city with a bonded indebtedness of \$4000 which is not payable until next year.

A balance of \$10,127 in cash was on hand in the treasury at the end of the period, the report said.

Only about \$1100 is still due from the county in 1940 taxes, Randle said.

## Linn Alarmed Over Second Slugging Case

Albany—Local and state police were mystified today when the second slugging within 48 hours took place Monday night at the Charles Jenks place near Tangent, the victim being Edwin A. Twilleger, 19, an employee on the Jenks ranch.

The youth, who was brought into the Albany General hospital soon after the incident took place, told officers that just as he was retiring late Monday night a man entered his room. Twilleger said he screamed and the man told him to "shut up," after which he slugged him and stole \$5 in currency.

When he regained consciousness the victim said he roused the Jenks family and his father was summoned to bring him into the hospital. He was treated for bruises and was scheduled to be released last night.

Kenneth Hogel, Eugene, who reported to police that he was slugged in a similar manner at midnight Sunday, was also expected to be released from the Albany General hospital last night, after recovering from bruises and a facial cut he received at the hands of five men, who he reported had attacked him and stolen \$25 from him just south of Albany on the Pacific highway.

Albany—Recovery of the body of Bernard Nepper, 20, who drowned Sunday night in the Willamette river three and a half miles below Albany, was made yesterday afternoon by Fire Chief Don Hayne, Dr. G. F. Redi, uncle of the victim, and Jack McReynolds, of the Albany fire department. The youth's body had not traveled more than 20 feet from the point where he went down. It was reported by Chief Hayne. Funeral services were to be held this morning at 9 o'clock from St. Mary's Catholic church, with Rev. Father L. Jarke celebrating the mass. Burial was to be in Willamette Memorial park. Besides his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joe Nepper, the youth is survived by four brothers and a sister, Alexander, Christopher, Jack, Lawrence and Katherine, all of Albany.
