

Cash Balance Albany Due to Tax Payments

Albany—Albany finished the first six months of this year with a cash balance of \$47,587.16 in its treasury; with only \$2,350.42 in warrants outstanding; a bond indebtedness of \$92,990 and net debts totaling only \$19,350.84. It was shown in the second 1940 quarterly report of Karl Horton, city recorder, which he released Thursday.

The recorder stated, however, that the heaviest tax payments of the year are in the treasury and that operating costs henceforth will probably be in excess of tax payments accruing before the year's end.

The cash balance on hand at the end of the second quarter was twice that which showed at the end of the first quarter.

Receipts during the first six months of this year totaled \$67,468, which together with a \$23,610.53 balance inherited from the previous quarter gave the treasury a total of \$91,078.65, the report shows.

Expenditures totaled \$43,491.57.

Second Forum Formed
Albany—Organization of Oregon's second Junior Chamber of Commerce auxiliary was accomplished in Albany Wednesday at a meeting held at the home of Mrs. Hollis Hull.

The first such auxiliary in the state was formed in Portland.

The women deferred action upon a constitution and by-laws until instruction can be procured from national headquarters at Chicago, but proceeded nevertheless to elect officers.

Mrs. Hull was named president; Mrs. Ralph Sanders, vice-president, and Mrs. Charles Royce, secretary-treasurer.

The group will hold its second meeting July 30.

Husbands Face Jail
Albany—Two ex-husbands have been declared in contempt of court for failure to provide for their ex-wives in accordance with provisions contained in their divorce decrees.

Earl M. Hall is given 60 days in which to pay his former wife a total of \$165 in attorney's fees and support money for their children, and Leonard Pitman is given 60 days in which to produce \$115 in attorney's fees and alimony.

A full sentence is the alternative offered to each defendant.

Model Airplane Owners Compete Albany Sunday

Albany—Gasoline model airplane owners from all over the central Willamette valley and from Portland will meet in Albany Sunday for the first Willamette valley model plane contest held here.

It is announced by Oakl Korf, chairman of the model airplane committee of the Albany Junior Chamber of Commerce, which is sponsoring the meeting.

Ten awards are being offered in the various classes, it was stated.

According to advance notice received by Korf, the Portland and Salem clubs will send big delegations, while Independence, Monmouth, Corvallis and Eugene, as well as Albany, will be represented.

Approximately 100 entries are expected. National rules will prevail at the meet Korf said. All records will be official and eligible to state or national standing. Distance traveled will determine the awards.

The meet will start at 8 a. m., it was stated.

Red Cross Swimming School Will Close

Silverton—The Red Cross swimming school which has attracted so much attention of people of both sexes and of all ages will hold the final classes Saturday afternoon and just afternoon.

At the exhibition Saturday afternoon beginning at 2 p. m. demonstrations of swimming will be given by all groups: the tadpoles the beginners, the swimmers, with games and diving and life saving demonstration. Awards will be presented by Judge George Rossman.

To pass the final tests the beginners are required to make grades in breath holding, rhythmic breathing, prone float, back float, back float, back glide, glide on front and on back, arm stroke, finning, combined stroke for front and for back, change of direction, turning over, leveling off, jump into water deep water, jump into deep water, plain front dive and a first and second combined test.

The intermediates must give leg strokes, arm strokes, 50 yards elementary backstroke, 100 yards selected stroke, burning on a closed course, one minute floating, 15 minute tread water, underwater swimming, standing front dive, running jump into deep water and a five minute swim.

Independence Methodists to Rename Church

Independence—Supplementary articles of incorporation for the Methodist church have been prepared and will be filed in our time, changing the name of the Independence Methodist Episcopal church to the Independence Methodist church, to conform to the regulations of the Methodist conference in the uniting of the several branches of Methodism.

The articles were signed by J. G. McIntosh, president of the board of trustees; Mrs. F. G. Hewett, secretary; J. E. Kelley and C. D. Smiley, members of the board.

One copy of the articles will be filed with the corporation commissioner and the other with the county clerk.

The church was organized in 1893 by a group of members who had formed themselves into a religious society and elected as their officers: J. S. Smith, president; J. A. Mills, secretary; and the following trustees: George Skinner, J. A. Mills, George W. Claggett, J. S. German and J. D. Stevens. These names appear on the original articles of incorporation, and were sworn to before H. Hirschberg, a notary public, March 7, 1893.

George W. Claggett is the only living member of that board as far as can be ascertained, and he is living with his sister, Mrs. Sarah Young, in this city.

Rev. Lawrence Guderian is now pastor of the local church and has plans for the strengthening of the organization through well appointed committees, and these committees are cooperating with him in the development of his plans.

The church depends entirely upon voluntary offerings of the people of the community and has met all obligations for the year. It operates on a budget system. It is well organized in all of its departments.

Plans are under way for painting and decorating the church in the near future. The tower is to be rebuilt and as soon as that is completed the work of painting will go forward.

Water Rights Hold Interest

Stayton—Over 400 people appeared at the city hall Thursday, to either seek information regarding water rights, or to file on water rights. Applications were also accepted. This meeting was conducted by John Logan, Jr., and Chester Cummings, engineers from the state engineer's department.

The proceedings were principally to determine the rights, initiated prior to the passage of the water code on February 24, 1909. Up to date there was no procedure fixed by law requiring persons appropriating water to make a public record of their rights. Since the 1909 Code, all water rights had to be initiated by the filing of an application with the state engineer and the securing of a permit to appropriate the water.

For those persons who have commenced the use of water since 1909, without securing a permit from the state engineer, the only application with the state engineer for a permit, just as if they were making an entirely new application for water.

Summer Period Training Ends At Monmouth

Monmouth—The Monmouth training school, in session for six weeks of summer work for the children, closed Thursday following assembly.

Programs and dramatizations of projects studied during the term concluded the work in the various rooms. The pre-primary and junior primary, under the guidance of Mrs. H. Blake, made a study of live pigs. Bantam chickens and guinea pigs were housed at the school and their habits and care studied by the small children.

As a resume of their summer's study, children under Mrs. Jeldy in the second and third grades reviewed their projects on fire, its hazards, prevention and control in a program Wednesday morning before classes of the Oregon College of Education and the primary classes.

Miss Neva Dallas' fourth and fifth grades climaxed their term study by presenting an original play in assembly Thursday morning, to which the local public was bidden.

The evolution of the printing press was an interesting topic for Miss Dora Scheffsky's sixth and seventh grades. As this year marks the 500th anniversary of the invention of movable type by Gutenberg at Mainz, Germany, the senior intermediate pupils studied the history of how man has preserved the records from the pictures the cave man carved on his stone walls down to the most modern forms of printing.

In the course of the study the pupils visited the Monmouth Herald office, the Capital Journal building and the Oregon Pulp and Paper mill at Salem. With the aid of screens the classes culminated their project under the following topics: History of Recording, History of Printing Use of Paper, Making of Paper, Use of Printing and Printing for the Blind.

The eighth grade, supervised by Mrs. P. Cox, made a study of industries relative to making a living. Outside speakers added zest to the course. On Wednesday the pupils were requested to tell of the professions they desired to follow.

Earning a Living in Our Community was the text for the project of the junior high school group. The subject furnished two main purposes: To learn more of the various types of work locally and to study the type of work which appealed as a life job to the pupils, the class visited the local newspaper office, the bank, grain warehouse and the paper mill in Salem. They interviewed C. F. Gillette, local attorney, and Miss Gull, nurse at the O. C. E.
