

Polk County Health Nurse Active in Last Quarter

Report Shows Much Activity In All Lines

Dallas—A report of the second quarter of 1940 has been released by Miss Margaret Gillis, county health nurse in which she states that she was amazed at the amount of work she had been able to cover during this period, in going over the report sent to the state department of health, division of nursing service.

Back of that statistical report lies all of the planning, home and office calls, the humanitarian side, the human needs, planning adjustments to enable parents to have as adequate care as possible for their children in the matter of health protection, cooperating with other organizations, requests from family physicians and from social service workers of state departments for examination of children at the University of Oregon Medical School clinics.

During the week, June 8 to 15, 12 children were admitted to the Doernbecher hospital for hernia, appendicitis, nose and throat cases. All were referred either by family physician or University of Oregon Medical School clinic. This group was from all parts of the county, Vashon, West Salem, Grand Ronde, Valley Junction, Oak Grove, Ballston, McCoy, Monmouth and Independence. The Shrine hospital and clinic has also cared for a number of children for Polk county.

The crippled children's department of the State Welfare commission has cared for a number of crippled children. This department has also cared for cleft palate cases which are followed up by correct speech training. There is also skin grafting for old burns and an endless number of patients having splendid care.

During the last three months, Polk county had its first crippled children's clinic with an attendance of 29. The clinic was held at the Dallas Women's club rooms with members of the Daughters of the Nile rendering a big help to those in charge.

Pre-school and baby clinics were held in Independence, Monmouth, Dallas and West Salem and were well attended. At Monmouth and Independence all children had immunization for diphtheria and vaccination for smallpox. At all of these clinics the children had careful dental examinations with the doctors and dentists giving of their service free. It took a great deal of their time and Miss Gillis states that the service was greatly appreciated and extends thanks to all who gave of their time.

This period of time has seen the final group of schools in the county covered with skin tests for tuberculosis. The response from all, except one, was outstanding. The majority were 100 per cent cured for. Into this group came parents, pre-school children and other adults. In some of the schools the school boards rendered understanding help and support. The percentage of positive reactors, among the entire school group, was less than 10 per cent. All positive reactors were examined at the State Tuberculosis hospital at Salem with only a few scheduled for reexamination.

The work does not end here for there is the infant, maternity and child welfare service and the morbidity service that is never finished, also, the school health service, the community problems, the many investigations, come in connection with venereal cases, are all a very necessary part of the nurse's work.

Assault Trial Date is Set; Fines Levied

Albany—L. Blake Alphin will stand trial on an assault and battery charge in justice court July 30 at 1 p.m. Justice of the Peace Victor Oliver announced Tuesday Alphin was admitted to \$300 bail.

Alphin is alleged to have assaulted Robert Dunn, 13, with a club, after an alleged altercation arose over the trespassing of a cow on Alphin's property. Ward Collier, uncle of young Dunn, was the complainant.

The duo pleaded guilty and Judge Oliver assessed a fine of \$25 on Alvin but suspended the fine on Speal as Alvin claimed possession of the one gun, telling the judge that the two had but one gun, one car and one club between them and that they belonged to him.

Jasper Fred Hicks ran afoul of the law when he attempted to drive his car while intoxicated. Arrested with him was Edward Loyd Lochner, who was charged with drunkenness. Both are in the county jail. Hicks was placed under \$150 bail by Judge Oliver and Lochner had his bail placed at \$50. Neither was able to produce bail. Their case has been continued until Wednesday to enable them to secure counsel.
