Anderson Will Head Plywood Products Plant

Lebanon—A. E. "Al" Anderson, who has been appointed general manager of the Evans Products company plywood plant which is under construction here, will move his home from Tacoma to Lebanon next week.

Anderson, his wife and small son will occupy the residence on Second street owned by T. G. Cowgill. In Tacoma, Anderson was production superintendent for the Northwest Door company for five years, previous to which he was in Portland with another plywood concern.

Good progress is being made on construction of the Evans plant's main building, which covers four acres. The superstructure is well started, with all posts in place and a large part of the trusses erected. Several sections of trusses have been covered with the purlins, over which is to be laid sheets of plywood and finally a composition roof. Siding of the building is to start before the end of the week.

Contract for construction of the main building was awarded the Industrial Engineers and Contractors, Inc., of Tacoma. The McManama company is erecting the power house and engine house, and these two structures are rising rapidly.

Firemen Cooperative

Lebanon—The Lebanon fire department assisted the Halley department and neighboring farmers Tuesday in extinguishing a fire just north of Tangent which covered approximately 100 acres of grain fields before it could be brought under control. A large amount of vetch, some standing and some sacked, was destroyed. Scio Schools Seek Federal Aid Projects

Scio—Approval of Scio school district's WPA application for approximately \$700 for school ground improvement, etc., which was granted several weeks ago, still is without results, according to reports. The local district board was notified at the time of approval that work was to start about July 8, but nothing since has been heard from the matter. Hope has been expressed by the board and others interested in the local school situation that operations would be started in time to afford completion of the project before fall rains begin.

Another project in which the school is deeply interested is proposed moving of the city hall to a new location in order the present site of the building may be used for school-ground purposes, as has been contemplated for a year or more.

City council is to sponsor moving the hall, with expenses to be paid by WPA, which also is to supervise the work. Under date of July 15 the acting director of the Salem division of WPA operations wrote interested Scio people as follows:

"The project proposal was submitted on June 19 for final approval. Since that date we have not received information concerning the status of the project."

"You may be assured that we will immediately transmit any current information to you relative to the progress of the proposal."

More than a year ago, purchase of the city hall lot for additional school grounds was negotiated by the school board and the city council, the board paying \$150 for the lot.

In event of final negotiations, the city hall will be located on the corner lot immediately east of the present site, will face south instead of east, and it is understood, will have concrete foundation.

It is believed a fine shade tree on the north of the proposed lot will have to be removed to make proper room for the city building.
