

Migratory Workers' Camp Given Lebanon Sponsors

Business Men Inspect Site Near Stayton

Lebanon—A federal camp for migratory workers appears almost certain to be established in this vicinity next berry season, a committee of four business men reported here following an inspection of the federal camp in Stayton and conferences with officials there. The committee, representing the Lebanon Commercial club, said Lebanon is assured of a camp providing the proper officials are convinced there is need for it here and providing the plan has the full support of the community.

Arrangements were made at Stayton for John Cooter, with the federal administrative agricultural offices at Salem, to speak at the next meeting of the Commercial club, which is sponsoring the proposal. Cooter, who may be accompanied by other officials from his office, will describe the camps and the steps to be taken to procure one here. Several major berry growers of this vicinity are to be invited to the meeting, which is scheduled Monday, August 12.

The committee making the Stayton trip consisted of C. B. Spencer, chairman, Mayor T. W. Munyan, L. E. Arnold and W. H. Ballie.

Linn County Tax Payments are Heavy

Albany—Taxes paid into the Linn county treasury since January 1 equal more than 80 percent of the total levy, it was revealed by the semi-annual report of Sheriff Herbert Shelton. The report shows that collections, including delinquent taxes and interest, total \$769,494.31. The total levy is \$932,104.12, leaving only \$162,609.81 to be collected during the remainder of the year if the total levy is to be equaled.

Of the 1940 levy alone, however, \$589,928.19, or a little less than two-thirds, has thus far been paid, the sheriff reported. Delinquencies collected so far this year total \$182,565.81, including interest.

Collections were made for years as far back as 1889, for which year \$2.81 in principal and 17 cents in interest was paid by one property owner, the report revealed.

Bug Chasing Scarcity Hobby

Silverton—To have an interesting hobby is not out of the ordinary, but to have one such as William Scarth, senior member of the William Scarth and Sons Feed Mill, is different.

Scarth experiments during his off-work hours, in eradicator for troublesome insects that infest grain, plant or flower life, and is very generous with his discoveries in advice to his horticultural associates.

The troublesome garden pest, a late comer and very destructive to green and blossom growth, a small winged insect of black and yellow coloring, disappears definitely under a spray mixed by Scarth and put to the test last week.

Dallas Enters Safety Drive In Competition

Dallas—According to Mayor Lelf S. Finseth, Dallas will compete with other municipalities in its population class in a campaign to show an improvement in the number of traffic accidents involving property damage, injuries and deaths for the year 1940, as compared to the preceding three-year average. City Recorder J. R. Craven and Chief of Police Tony Neufeldt are also actively engaged in the contest.

At the end of the year large highway plaques, suitable for display at city entrances, will be awarded to the cities with the best record in each of the four population divisions. In addition, a certificate of award suitable for framing and posting in a prominent place, will be presented. Plaques awarded winners in the 1939 contest may now be seen at city entrances of Medford, Bend, Burns and Woodburn.

Cities are grouped as follows: First division, 10,000 population and over; second division, 5000 to 10,000 population; third division, 2000 to 5000 population; fourth division, 1000 to 2000 population. The contest is sponsored by Earl Snell, secretary of state.

In judging each city's record, the number of accidents involving property damage, injuries and deaths for each month will be compared to the preceding three-year average for the city. Where improvement is shown, the city will be ranked high and where no improvement or retrogression is shown, the city will be ranked lower in the standings.
