Bride-Elect is Feted by Debs

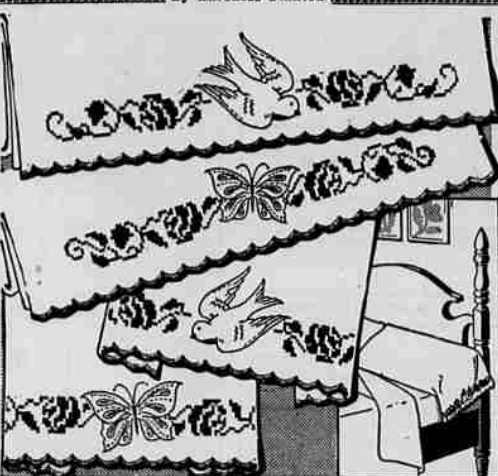
