

Court Will Get Expert to Examine Fehl

The mental condition of Earl Fehl, seeking release from the state hospital on a writ of habeas corpus, will be subjected to a mental examination of the court's own selection, Judge Calvin L. Sweek, sitting on the case from Pendleton, announced yesterday afternoon after testimony had been completed.

Dr. C. A. Loehner, psychiatrist, had testified for the defense as to examinations which he had made of Fehl with assistance of Dr. Louis K. Poyntz in which he had denied that certain opinions expressed by Fehl could be characterized as indicating he is of the paranoid type and he also expressed doubt as to the diagnosis made originally by three physicians which preceded Fehl's commitment to the state hospital. Fehl's counsel had introduced into evidence the typewritten transcript of the examination made by Dr. Loehner.

Superintendent J. C. Evans testified that he considered inadequate the examinations made by the Drs. Loehner and Poyntz stating that it took his entire staff several weeks to arrive at a conclusion relative to Fehl's mental condition.

Pending a further examination by the alienist of the court's own choosing Judge Sweek took his decision under advisement. Superintendent Evans and Dr. Loehner were the sole witnesses at yesterday afternoon's session, closing the testimony.

Promotions in Oregon Guard

Appointment of 39 new officers and promotion of 27 others in the Oregon National Guard was approved today by the war department, this authorization being the largest of its kind in the state's history. Major General George A. White said today.

Similar increases also were granted to the national guards of Washington, Idaho, Montana and Wyoming, but the figures for these states were not available here. The guardsmen of five states constitute the 41st division, commanded by General White, which begins three weeks of maneuvers at Fort Lewis, Wash., next week and which then will be mobilized for about a year.

In the Oregon national guard, 13 majors will be promoted to lieutenant colonels, seven captains will become majors, and seven lieutenants will be promoted to captains. The 39 new officers will be appointed first and second lieutenants, and all must have served at least two years in the ranks.

General White called on regimental commanders Wednesday to submit recommendations for promotions and appointments.

He said there would be more promotions and appointments if the 41st division is increased from its present strength of 10,000 to a wartime strength of 20,000.

Harold M. West Wins Promotion

Portland, Or., Aug. 1.—Promotion of Harold M. West, Seattle, to assistant traffic manager of the Union Pacific railroad, was announced here today by Harvey E. Lounsbury, traffic manager. The appointment is effective August 1.

West has been assistant general freight and passenger agent for the Union Pacific in Seattle since 1932. He will continue to have his headquarters in Seattle.

West is a past president of the Yakima Chamber of Commerce and of the Seattle Transportation club and is widely known in transportation circles. He began as an office boy in the traffic department of the Union Pacific in 1906 in Portland and became traveling freight and passenger agent at Walla Walla in 1918. After returning to Portland in 1917 in the same capacity he was promoted in 1920 to district freight and passenger agent at Yakima, leaving Yakima in 1932 for larger responsibilities in Seattle.

Appointment of Ehmke Announced

Appointment of M. W. Ehmke, as assistant general freight agent for Southern Pacific company, with headquarters in Portland, was announced by H. W. Klein, general freight agent, to become effective August 1. Ehmke succeeds W. H. Francis, who is being promoted to general freight agent for Southern Pacific at El Paso.

Ehmke, whose service with Southern Pacific began in 1917 on the Salt Lake division, was for many years in the traffic department at Fresno. In 1934 he was transferred to the company's general freight department in San Francisco, later becoming head of the transcontinental freight rate bureau.

Francis has been assistant general freight agent in Portland since March, 1936. Prior to that he had been service with Southern Pacific in El Paso, Tucson, Los Angeles and various other points on the system, including several years on the Southern Pacific of Mexico. He has been employed by the railroad since 1906.

To the Editor: Your editorial on Saturday, July 23, entitled "Enforced Patriotism," interested me very much. It is my honest conviction that he should have sent out an order that the absence of registration within thirty days of his order would be absolute grounds for summary dismissal of every employee.

At first thought you might say that I was making some sideline comments, as a member of a different political party, possibly for political reasons. I would like, however, to call your attention to the fact that at one of the first meetings of the game commission, after I was appointed to that body by General Martin, I proposed an order which was voted unanimously by that commission, that no person should remain in the employ of the state game commission who was not a registered voter. In my opinion, no citizen of Oregon deserves to be on the payroll of the state which is paid for by the taxpayers, who does not take enough interest in government to register and vote.

More power to Ormond Bean and I hope that some other public servants will emulate his action.

Boeing Union Delays Strike For Ten Days

Seattle, Aug. 1 (AP)—Union employees of the Boeing Aircraft corporation's three Seattle plants, acting on appeals that they do nothing to retard national defense production, voted last night, an hour and a half before the midnight deadline, to delay at least 10 days a threatened strike.

The workers, opposing a proposed reduction in wages in lower brackets, authorized their negotiations committee to continue their efforts to reach a settlement with the company.

Their decision came at a dramatic mass meeting before the midnight deadline they had set for the walk-out. They voted shortly before a telegram was received from Secretary of Labor Perkins urging them to postpone the strike again.

The vote came after a similar telegram was read from J. R. Steelman, labor department commissioner of conciliation in Washington, D. C.

The extension was recommended by the negotiations committee and by Harvey W. Brown, international president of the International Association of machinists. Brown pledged the support of the international in resistance of U. S. army bombers, which has been proceeding at full speed with approximately 6,800 men at work.

The point of dispute between the aeronautical mechanics union and the company is the company's proposal to cut the starting pay of unskilled beginners from 62 1/2 cents an hour to 55 cents. The company has granted pay increases in the upper brackets.

Centralia Man Shot by Farmer
Lester Garrison, 60, of Centralia, Wash., was shot in the face Tuesday night with six pellets from a shot gun in the hands of E. G. Fuson, farmer near Aumsville, as a result, apparently, of mistaken identity. Garrison is in a Salem hospital making satisfactory progress towards recovery.

Fuson told officers that he had had trouble with corn thieves and that he thought Garrison was about his premises for no good purpose. He said he saw Garrison leave his property and enter the road, and that he fired over Garrison's head and ordered him to stop. Garrison did not stop, so Fuson fired again, wounding him in the face and hand.

When Fuson found a mistake had been made he gave Garrison assistance, took him to a doctor at Stayton and the doctor sent him to the hospital. Garrison said he and his daughter, Virginia, 16, were on their way to the farm of Ed Henkle, Jr., a relative, near West Stayton with the expectation of picking beans.

Sheriff A. G. Burk said that Fuson had complained several days previously of marauders about his place and had been warned not to shoot at anyone with a loaded gun. District Attorney Lyle J. Page said no charge would be made against Fuson unless Garrison decides to prosecute.
