As I have written many times before, there is no meaning to the term service plate (or place plate) other than "the plate that is put at each place when the table is set."

The only rule is that the plates chosen for your table setting shall be suitable in size and design for the appointments of your table.

Platter sets, plates, or saucers, are equally bad. This subject was suggested by a reader who asked: "When fruit cocktail, served in a stemmed glass, is to be the first course at dinner, may the small glass plate that belongs to the tablecloth—dispensing with the service plate?"

The answer is NO. And the reason is that such a plate is too small to put in the center of a place either as a table setting or at any other time.
