Time is Pacific Standard. New York, Aug. 13 (AP)—Broadcast from London by Anthony Eden, British secretary of war, will be relayed by two networks Wednesday.

As now scheduled, he will be heard first via WEAF-NBC at 9 a.m. with a second relay from a recording by the MBS network at 12:15 p.m. He will discuss the general war situation. The broadcast previously had been announced only for MBS.

Speaking in reply to Gen. John J. Pershing's recent broadcast in which he advocated sale of a number of U. S. World War destroyers to England, Sen. David I. Walsh of Massachusetts is to talk on CBS at 6:15 tonight. His topic, "Navy for Our Own Defense."

Air Traffic Flow Predicted by Crary

Portland, Aug. 13 (AP)—Harold Crary, vice-president of traffic for United Airlines, today predicted a substantial flow of air commerce between Alaska and points throughout the United States.

Crary had just completed a flight to the northern territory. He said it was now only a matter of hours instead of days between major cities of this country and towns within the shadow of the Arctic circle.

Before leaving Chicago, Crary said Airline business is running almost 60 per cent ahead of last year.

Taft Offers New Plan for Nation's Army

Washington, Aug. 13 (AP)—Senator Taft (R., Ohio), proposed today that the United States create a permanent special system of voluntary military training, rather than resort to conscription.

As the senate resumed its debate on the controversial Burke-Wadsworth compulsory service bill, Taft offered a substitute plan which he said was designed to build up and maintain a reservoir of 1,500,000 trained men.

Senator Barkley of Kentucky, the democratic leader, voiced opposition however, to any substitute or compromise measures which would delay inauguration of a conscription program.

Meanwhile, legislation empowering the president to mobilize the national guard and reserves advanced another step toward enactment. The house military committee voted unanimously last night to recommend passage of the senate-approved measure, but made several changes in its provisions.

The committee retained the requirement that men called to the colors should be restored to their former, or equivalent, jobs after their year's active service, but struck out the provision that an employer's failure to reinstate a man would constitute unfair labor practice under the national labor relations act.

It also revised the national guard provisions to require mandatory discharge, upon request, of a guardsman with one or more absolute dependents.

In offering his conscription substitute, Taft said it approved a comprehensive plan for training the youth of the nation, without disturbing their schooling or divorcing them from their jobs, through the establishment of a separate army training corps and the encouragement of three to four years high school and college military courses.

Greek-Italian Tension Grows More Dangerous

Rome, Aug. 13 (AP)—Authoritative Italian circles indicated tonight that Italy would claim slices of both Greek and Yugoslav territory sooner or later as due Italian-ruled Albania in a "general settlement."

Virginio Gayda, authoritative fascist editor and often Mussolini's mouthpiece, said the Italian government expected Greece to "answer for its new crimes." Gayda declared Italy could not tolerate Greece's "acts against the independence of Albania" and accused Greece of designs on Albania.

With the Italian-Greek tension mounting, friction between Italy and Yugoslavia was reported by the fascist press.

The Yugoslav difficulty, according to the newspaper La Tribuna, was over the killing of a fascist in the Italian town of Zara on the Yugoslav coast. The Zara populace was said to be aroused.

Fascist Leonardo Clurcovich, the dispatch said, was killed when he objected to a stranger singing a Slav song on a Zara street.

It failed to say how Clurcovich, a minor fascist leader in a Zara suburb, had been killed except that he had been "barbarously slain." It described him as Zara's "first fascist martyr whose name will be fittingly honored."

Virginio Gayda, fascist editor who often reflects official opinion, accused Greece of seeking to seize part of Italian-held Albania. The accusation was contained in Gayda's rejection of a Greek version of the slaying near the Greek frontier of an Albanian, Daut Hoggia.

Willkie Likes Flynn Attitude

Colorado Springs, Colo., Aug. 13 (AP)—Asserting that even Chairman Edward J. Flynn of the democratic national committee should "understand that there is a limit to political ruthlessness," Wendell L. Willkie said today:

"I am gratified to learn that Attorney General Robert Jackson and Senator Hatch (D-NM) have today joined in my campaign to prevent the democratic national committee from brazenly violating both the corrupt practices act and the Hatch act by the sale of democratic campaign books."

"The corporate advertisements in these campaign books were in many instances obtained from the corporations because such corporations either hoped to escape punishment from the federal government or receive reward from it."

"It is a step forward that this method of raising campaign funds has been eliminated. Even Boss Flynn (Edward J. Flynn, new democratic chairman) certainly ought to now understand that there is a limit to political ruthlessness."

Centennial Pledges May All Turn Back

Financial success of the Salem Centennial was indicated today by Irl McSherry, vice president and general manager of the celebration, in speaking before the Kiwanis club when he said that "the commission hoped they could turn back all pledges given in underwriting the celebration."

McSherry took the club members "behind the scenes" as he outlined the work of the commission, appointed last October with an executive committee of 17 members.

Later there were 35 committee chairmen selected and over 500 persons working in some capacity. As general manager he personally attended 119 general committee meetings, 20 meetings of the executive committee and gave 34 public addresses on the centennial.

Special mention was given Jerrald Owen, publicity chairman, with McSherry estimating that could the space given in newspapers been purchased it would have cost in excess of \$11,000. He also praised George Stackman and the Whiskerins and Ray J. Stumbo for supervision of the stage. To correct many rumors, McSherry said that the contract with Mrs. Doris Smith, of Portland, for directing the pageant was \$600. Many had said the amount was many times in excess of this figure, he declared.

Yelm War Decree Due Late Today

Yelm, Wash., Aug. 13 (AP)—"Declaration of war" that will plunge 41,000 national guard and regular army troops into the largest and most realistic sham battle in the far west's history will be handed down about 5:30 p.m. today, officers heading the fourth army maneuvers revealed. Relations between the northern "reds" and the southern "blues" are "very strained," corps headquarters here reported.

The declaration, to be issued by Brigadier General Henry T. Burgin, chief umpire, will throw nine army encampments throughout southwest Washington into brisk activity as troops prepare to move up to battle positions under cover of darkness.

Artillery, ammunition and the bulk of the fighting men will be trucked into the region under black-out conditions. Motor convoys will be without headlights and tail lights will be covered with cloth.

Some infantry troops will march to battle, some of them from camps 20 miles out of the war zone.

Italians Fight to Reach Berbera

Rome, Aug. 13 (AP)—Italian troops in British Somaliland are fighting the main British forces fiercely in an attempt to reach the seaport of Berbera after occupying Adisaleh about 50 miles to the south, the high command reported today.

The battle is continuing in the Adisaleh zone following two days of sharp fighting in which one British plane was shot down and the Italians lost one plane, a communiqué said.

Italian advance units were moving on Berbera, the newspaper Piccolo said, with the support of the air force, which was said to be driving back to Aden British planes sent out to attack the Italian ground forces.

Piccolo also reported that Italian planes had bombed British troops and fortifications northwest of Lake Rudolph on the border of Ethiopia and Kenya colony.

Stefani, official Italian news agency, asserting that German and Italian planes were methodically wearing down the British air force by attacking its airdromes, workshops, factories and supply dumps.

Admiral Hart To Shanghai

Shanghai, Aug. 13 (AP)—Admiral Thomas Charles Hart, commander of the United States Asiatic fleet, was reported tonight to be making a hurried, unscheduled trip to Shanghai from Tsingtao in connection with conditions arising from Britain's decision to withdraw her troops from Shanghai.

It was understood he was to investigate reports that the Japanese are planning to take over the British defense sector in the most important sections of the International Settlement as soon as the British leave.

Admiral Hart will become the senior foreign officer present and as such is expected to preside over a meeting of heads of the foreign Shanghai defense forces Thursday in which allotment of the British zone will be considered.

That was the way he appraised the defense program in a chat with reporters at the end of an inspection of defense projects from a corner of Maine to New London, Conn.

The inspection tour ended last night at New London, with signs pointing to his starting another before the week closes—to the maneuvers of the first army in upstate New York.

The trip had supplied him with evidence, in New England, he said, of the speeding up of the intricate processes of turning dollars into guns, warships, submarines and torpedoes. It showed him, too, expanding facilities for training recruits to man and operate the finished war equipment.

Senator Rufus O. Holman telegraphed Snell today that the depot would be located in the Pacific northwest east of the Cascades. Snell said he understood also that the air corps would establish a laboratory, a pursuit plane base and a bomber base in the northwest.

The depot would have no connection with the proposed bombing range near Heppner, which would be used by planes based at McChord field, near Tacoma, Wash., Snell said.

Service Men Called Here To GOP Rally

Ex-service men from every section of Oregon are being invited to a state-wide rally to be held at the Marion Hotel Tuesday, August 27, the day of the McNary notification ceremony, according to J. Douglas McKay, chairman of the Marion county chapter of the Willie-McNary Oregon Veterans club. A permanent state organization will be formed at that time composed of veterans of all wars and political faiths to support the Willie-McNary ticket.

"Party lines have been swept aside by an enthusiastic group of ex-service men who have already enrolled in the Marion county chapter," declared chairman McNary. "It is their first opportunity to give active support to one of their comrades for the office of president of the United States. Mr. Willie served with distinction in France during 1917 and 1918 and has been active in veterans' affairs since the war."

Enrollment blanks being circulated throughout Marion county pledge those signing to the support of Wendell Willkie and Charles L. McNary. Only veterans and members of auxiliaries to veterans' organizations are being asked to sign. No support has been requested from the republican state central committee as the club is non-partisan. Marion county chapter officers of the Willie-McNary Oregon Veterans club are McKay, chairman; Dr. Benjamin F. Pound; Dr. Laban Steeves; Brazier Small and Ed Kennedy, vice-chairmen; James P. Turnbull, secretary, and Carl Gabrielsen, treasurer.

British Boats Engage Enemy

London, Aug. 13 (AP)—British motor torpedo boats fought a series of actions with larger enemy surface craft during the darkness of early today, the admiralty announced tonight. The British boats, speeding at 30 knots, sighted two small enemy ships 100 yards away.

One of the British craft immediately rammed one of the enemy while another British boat engaged the other with machine-guns and grenades at what was described as "almost point-blank range."

The admiralty said the British attack "took considerable effect while the enemy's return fire was ineffective."

A third British motor torpedo boat sighted two larger enemy ships and machine-gunned them at "very close range" it continued. Later another British motor torpedo boat fought two running battles with an enemy "E" boat. (small torpedo boat).

Other British motor torpedo boats, attacked by a German plane from 500 feet, set the plane ablaze by hot and accurate fire, the announcement said.

There were no British casualties and the only damage sustained was dealt the ramming torpedo boat, the admiralty asserted.

Ida B. Wise Smith Again Heads WCTU

Chicago, Aug. 13 (AP)—Mrs. Ida B. Wise Smith of Evanston, Ill., was reelected president of the national Women's Christian Temperance Union for the seventh consecutive time today.

Mrs. D. Leigh Colvin of New York vice president, also was reelected for the seventh time by delegates to the W.C.T.U. 66th annual convention. Both choices were unanimous.

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
