Knight Rites Held at Aurora

Hubbard—George W. Knight, 66, city recorder of Hubbard and a well known resident for more than 40 years, died at his home here Monday night after being in poor health for a number of years and bedfast for the past three weeks.

He was born in Canby, April 14, 1874, a son of the late Dr. Charles Knight, who for many years was a practicing physician in Canby and one of its first settlers. His mother was Catherine Schriver. George Knight came to Hubbard in 1899 and bought the general merchandise store of the late G. H. Beebe, which he conducted many years. He married Minnie Whitney, who survives him. He served on the city council and for the past six years has held the office of city recorder. In 1916 he sold the store in Hubbard and worked as a traveling salesman until seven years ago, when he suffered a stroke and had since been in poor health.

Beside his widow he is survived by two daughters, Helen Knight, a teacher in the Sheridan high school, and Anna E. Knight, who is employed in the office of Earl Snell at Salem; one son, Charles W. of Hubbard; two sisters, Mrs. Lou Grant of Seattle and Mrs. Esther McMullin of Hermiston, and one brother, A. F. Knight of Portland.

Funeral services were held this afternoon at the Miller mortuary in Aurora, with Rev. J. L. Green of Hubbard officiating. Interment was in the Hubbard cemetery. Pallbearers were John Blosser, George Grimsby, Paul Knapp, Dr. A. P. Despinasse, Mayor Garfield Veget and Henry Rahl.
