

Fire Chasers Get Warning Albany Chief

Albany—Persons who get a thrill and a lot of fun out of chasing fire trucks were the object of an ultimatum issued here yesterday by Fire Chief Don Hayne and authorized by the city council, following the regular meeting of the councilmen.

The matter was brought out before the city governing board Wednesday evening by Councilman M. P. Baltimore, who cited the incident which took place Tuesday afternoon when two trucks went out for a fire. So many cars swarmed between the first and second engines that the latter was considerably hampered in its route to the scene of the fire.

The city ordinance which covers this matter will be strictly enforced hereafter, Chief Hayne warned, prohibiting cars to park within three blocks of the fire scene, or within a block of the point where a fire engine has stopped. It also requires that all cars in the path of the moving fire trucks park until they have passed, and remain so until the trucks are at least 500 feet on their way.

School Gets Support

Albany—Moral support from the war department for the Albany Chamber of Commerce in the latter's effort to establish an aeronautics school at the Albany college site here was received in a letter from Major General H. H. Arnold, chief of the U. S. army air corps, to Senator Rufus Holman of Oregon, and relayed to Carl Curlee, secretary of the local chamber.

General Arnold's letter concerns a brochure submitted by the Albany Chamber of Commerce to Senator Holman detailing the Albany campus and buildings. The brochure had been submitted by the Oregon solon to the war department, and was returned to him for retransmission to the CAA at the suggestion of General Arnold.

The United States war department is not acquiring property or establishing aviation mechanical schools itself, but it is deeply interested in such projects and has taken cognizance of the Albany college campus, the correspondence shows.

At present the Aero Industries Technical Institute of Los Angeles is still at the head of the list of schools which are eyeing the local campus as a prospective site for a branch of its school. Secretary Curlee said that the institution is merely marking time before making a decision which will ultimately result in establishment of an aeronautics school at Albany.

Stovell of Benton county, and were traveling on the Pacific highway just north of Albany when they discovered sparks emanating from just behind the cap. They pulled to the side of the road and attempted to squelch the already blazing truck, by bringing into play a portable extinguisher.

When the two realized the fuel in the extinguisher was exhausted, they gave up trying to halt the fire and turned their attention to a grass fire which had started alongside the road. They were successful in their attempts there, but had to wait until an Albany fire department truck reached the scene to put out the truck blaze. The two youths were uninjured, but the bean truck and cargo were partially destroyed.
