

Club Exhibits Monmouth are Ready to Show

Monmouth — With the Polk county fair whipping into shape for the opening Friday morning, the grounds are buzzing with activity.

With 500 4-H club members planning to exhibit, thirteen community booths, which is four more than participated last year, and four commercial booths assigned places in the new stadium building on the fair grounds in the northwest section of Monmouth, the fair promises to be the best in years.

Side shows and carnival attractions arrived the early part of the week and are already in place and doing business.

A sports program is scheduled for each afternoon of the two days, from 2 to 4 o'clock. Contests featured the first day include, 50-yard dash for boys under ten; 50-yard dash for girls under ten; 75-yard dash for boys under thirteen; 50-yard dash for girls under thirteen; 100-yard dash for boys under seventeen; 100-yard dash, open, any age; 50-yard dash, ladies, any age; sack race, men; egg race, ladies; fat men's race, 200 pounds and over.

Saturday afternoon features bicycle race for girls seventeen and under; bicycle race for boys, any age; flag race, ladies; relay race, representatives from Union and Granges; specialty race, Farmers Union and Granges, team of two women and two men from each organization.

Prizes will be awarded each afternoon.

Scio Will Move Old City Hall

Scio — Telegraphic authorization to proceed with moving the city hall at Scio was received from Washington, D. C., this week by Mayor P. W. Schunk, who has acted as agent for the sponsor, the local city council, in the WPA project initiated a year ago.

It is believed this will consummate negotiations involving the Scio school district and the city council contemplating moving the city hall from its present location to a site immediately across McKinney street to the east.

The school district has arranged purchase of the present city hall site for additional high school grounds. Expense of moving the city building and of placing it in proper position facing the east is to be borne by the district.

Title to both properties has been conveyed, the city virtually exchanging the present site for the one sought to be occupied. Federal financial assistance through WPA was granted the district.

It is said to be the hope and expectation that the city hall will be located on the new site before winter rains come. Expense will amount to several hundred dollars, it is stated.

Lebanon City Council Talks About Project

Lebanon — Allocation of funds which will permit an expansive NYA program, awarding of a contract to lay three lateral sewers and decision to appoint an engineer to survey the city's inadequate sewer system were features of a long session of the city council Tuesday night.

The council authorized expenditures up to \$900 to provide materials and supervision for a NYA program which would undertake two projects: razing of old buildings on the city-owned Krumbel property, and construction of a permanent bath house in the river park. The two projects were recommended to the council by the park board. The program, employing around 30 boys, will first improve the Krumbel acreage, the timbers from its buildings will be used in construction of the bath house, which will boast two dressing rooms, showers, lavatories and a storage room. It will be erected chiefly of stone.

Lee Scott's bid of \$1,892.47 was the lowest of three bids, and he was awarded the contract to lay sewers on North Main street, Maple, Fifth and B streets. Other bidders were Henry Den Herder and Ed Kellenberger.

Instructions were given the street committee to appoint an engineer to survey the sewer system after Mayor T. W. Munyan pointed out the present system is very inadequate.

Acting favorably upon a petition, the council also ordered Ash street to be paved a 44 foot width, rather than the standard 32. The council in addition acted favorably upon a petition asking G street between Fifth and Seventh be graded and graveled. A petition asking the city abandon plans to pave Rose street between Main and Third was accepted, but no action was taken.

Air Squadron Planning 'Raid' Upon Fircorne
