

Linn County Highway Oiling Program Is Completed

Many Miles are Given Treatment During Summer

Lebanon—Approximately 22 miles of Linn county roads have been newly oiled in this year's oiling program which has just been completed, according to County Engineer Walter W. Larsen, who was here on business this week. In addition, many miles of roads oiled under previous years' programs were repaired or given sealed coats.

Roads newly surfaced include the following: Larsen said: three and one-half mile extensions of the Berlin and Lacombe roads; two and one-half miles on Tangent road, including one half mile within the city and two miles extending from the city limits; two miles on the Henshaw road; four miles on the poor farm road; six miles south of Harrisburg; and one half mile in Brownsville.

County roads repaired include a two mile section on the Berlin road just outside the city, on which extensive improvements were made.

Larsen said the maintenance program will continue indefinitely. Grading on the road past the airport, connecting the Santiam and "39" highways, is almost completed, and the project should be completed in about two weeks, Larsen concluded.
