

New Apartment Plan Announced For Lebanon

Lebanon—Thomas Gazeley, former Portland contractor who moved here recently, announced this week plans to erect between five and six duplex apartments, each costing approximately \$3000. He will start construction of the units after building a carpenter shop and garage, and a new residence for himself and family.

The apartments will be located near the Milton and Franklin street intersection. A large number of them, Gazeley said, will be completed by Christmas. The apartments will be of one bedroom size. Gazeley will reside in the carpenter shop until his residence is completed.

Building Brisk Around Albany; Boyles Jailed

Albany—City Recorder Karl Horton's books containing the listings of building permits in Albany each month show this month that the value of construction in Albany last month was a little more than \$14,000 in excess of the total value, thus far the current month has already outstripped July in the matter of residential construction.

Irvine Memorial Program Progresses

Scio—Substantial strides forward are believed to have been made at Scio Friday in the matter of erecting a monument in this city to the memory of the late B. F. Irvine, native of the Scio community and for many years a leading citizen of the state in educational, newspaper, religious and charitable work in his native state.

Floyd Bilyeu of Portland, a leading member of the general committee having the matter in charge, and himself a former Scion and high school graduate here, met with interested Scio people Friday and made tentative preliminaries to set the movement into tangible action in this city and elsewhere in the state.

Bilyeu named as local committee members Dr. A. G. Prill, Rolla Shelton, Postmaster E. Phillips Mayor P. W. Schunk, J. A. Withers and Joe Lytle, publisher of the Scio Tribune. "Mr. Irvine left an indelible imprint upon his native state of Oregon, and the monument movement seems to me wholly fitting, proper and feasible," Bilyeu said in Scio in discussing preliminary phases of the plan. "It seems particularly pertinent to have at Scio, Frank Irvine's old home town and the scene of his birth and early manhood, an enduring memorial to the sterling qualities, high-minded manhood, and the splendid accomplishments which marked this eminent scholar's trail through life in Oregon."

Several sites in Scio were inspected, with result that the committee settled upon a plot of 100 by 200 feet on the residence property of Dr. A. G. Prill, a pioneer of Scio and an old-time acquaintance of Mr. Irvine. This site has, on the north, the main highway approaching the city from the west, and a city street on the west. Bilyeu considered the location ideal for the purpose. Special price of \$500 was quoted by Dr. Prill for the site.

Membership of the committee may be further expanded, Bilyeu said. Many influential men throughout the state have manifested enthusiasm in the movement. Bilyeu stated. Several thousand dollars no doubt will readily be subscribed for the purpose by many who knew Mr. Irvine and who appreciate his valuable contributions to Oregon and its welfare, Bilyeu said.

Bilyeu exhibited architectural likenesses of the monument, which, as presented at the time, contemplates a granite structure 16 to 18 feet in height. It will bear appropriate inscription. As finally selected, however, the monument may be smaller than mentioned.

Dedication as a state site may be requested of the state legislature at its next session in January, Bilyeu stated. In this event, a state board of trustees would probably be created with authority to effect permanent maintenance of the plot.
