Pupils in the elementary grades whose parents reside outside of school district No. 2 (Dallas) must pay tuition, to be paid in advance to the superintendent. Tuition is not collected from high school pupils who reside in some other school district of the state where no high school is maintained. The superintendent has been instructed not to receive in school pupils who are subject to tuition, unless they have paid tuition for the first half of the school year. The rate of tuition is based on actual cost per pupil of conducting school for the past session, and is as follows: For grades—first to eighth inclusive—\$25 for the half year; for high school—\$50 for the half year.
