

Gourleys Take Major Awards At Cattle Show

Albany—Three members of the Gourley family, living near Albany, took a majority of the awards in the 4-H cattle division of the annual two-day Linn county 4-H club and FFA fall show at Bryant park Thursday, and walked away with six out of the total of 14 awards that had been determined.

In competition with 24 contestants who vied in the dairy showmanship contest, which led off the 4-H fair's events, Stuart Gourley took first, Stanley Gourley took second and a sister, Ruth, was awarded third.

These same Gourleys finished in the same three top positions with their Jersey senior yearling exhibit, in which Stanley and Stuart alternated. In the Jersey producing cow class, Stuart's entry took first.

Ranking fourth and fifth in the showmanship event were Gordon Cooley of Albany and William Richardson of Stayton, respectively.

Robert Harrison's producing Jersey cow took second; the entry of Loren Fisher, Albany, third, and Zelman Bond, Albany, fourth. Harrison was from Shedd.

Judging the dairy exhibits is W. C. Leth, Polk county agent; Harry Riches, Marion county agent is judging sheep, swine and demonstrations. Prof. A. G. B. Bouquet of Oregon State college is passing on vegetable garden exhibits and corn; Mrs. Gladys Johnson is judging canning, and L. E. Arnold, Lebanon, is poultry judge. The fair will end Saturday.

Putative Farmers in their dairy showmanship contest finished in the following order: Warren Cooley, first; Bob Oling, second; Earl Kennell, third; Harold MacHugh, fourth, and Willis Burk, fifth.

Warren Cooley's producing Jersey cow ranked first, MacHugh's second and Oling's third.

In the yearling heifer class, Richard Karstens took first, Cooley second, Oling third, and MacHugh fourth and fifth.

The 4-H fair is under general supervision of O. E. Mikesell, Linn county 4-H club agent, and the FFA section is under general supervision of John Welbes, Albany Smith-Hughes instructor.
