

## Independence Hop Fiesta Ends Tonight

Independence—Streets of this city were lined last night when a crowd of several thousand people witnessed the patriotic torchlight parade as the climax of the seventh annual hop fiesta neared a close. The observance will pass into history tonight after the midnight matinee at the hopbowl.

Six classes of entries in the parade were judged with the Salem Cherrifans taking first place in the marching division and Mr. Angel Flaxarians second. The Albany Junior drum corps placed first in the band division with the Melisinger accordion band of Salem second and Lebanon band third. Representing Garden club took top honors, the Independence Odd Fellows second and Yamhill county third. In the commercial section the Independence company placed first, A. J. Thomas hardware company second and the Monmouth hardware company third. R. H. Collins, of Lebanon, impersonating Abraham Lincoln, headed the list of non-commercial entries with Mrs. Cronwell second and Shirley Henry third. The sheriff's mounted posse of Salem took the award for the best out of town entry.

Heading the parade were the massed colors of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and Company L, Oregon National guard, of Dallas, Tommie Hinkle, of Salem, broadcast the event over a public address system.

## School Buses Give Problem

Silverton—Superintendent H. W. Adams of the local school system, is asking that a more definite statement concerning the running of buses for transporting pupils from the rural districts be made.
