

Colonel Wootton Tells Club How Draft Will Work

Lebanon—Stressing that responsibility of selective service will rest largely on the shoulders of local civilian leaders, Col. Elmer V. Wootton, National Guard officer in the Adjutant General's office in Salem, gave a comprehensive address before the Lions club Thursday noon on the draft bill now before congress, what it is designed to do and how it will operate in the nation, Oregon and various communities.

Colonel Wootton, who was introduced by Dr. Joel C. Booth, emphasized local committees of which there will be one for each 30,000 population in the county, will supervise the work under the direction of army officials. Additional civilians will take part in this task as registrars and physical examiners.

The first step in the program will be registration of all males between the ages of 18 and 45 on a day proclaimed by the president, the colonel said. Registration will be done in the usual voting polls. Registration cards will be delivered to the county clerk and the cards shuffled and numbered. The number of registrants in each county will be supplied headquarters in Salem, and in turn the master board in Washington, where the quota for each state will be determined, and a lottery held with numbers drawn to determine who of each county shall be chosen for examining.

The speaker continued that those whose numbers are drawn will fill out a questionnaire, and the advisory board will classify each man in one of the following divisions: whether he is available for immediate service, for combat or non-combat duty; deferred for reason of occupation; deferred because of dependents; deferred because of his holding certain types of public office.

Those placed in class one will be given physical examinations by local physicians. Appeal boards will be set up in each congressional district, and also medical advisory boards, 10 in this state.

Colonel Wootton estimated that on a basis of 100,000 men who may be inducted into peacetime service this winter, \$200 would be lost from Oregon.

In this first order, there is about one chance in 10 a registrant will be selected for service, the speaker said.

The speaker, who has been a member of the guard since before the World war and for the last 13 years on full time duty, also reviewed the history of selective service. He stated there was nothing new about it, that some sort of compulsory service has been employed in every major conflict this nation has been engaged in. The present bill, he said, is a development of the 1917 draft and a study of the matter instituted in 1920 and since continued.

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Captain Sims Commander Of Company

Woodburn—Captain Eburn T. Sims of Woodburn has been placed in command of Headquarters company, 166th Infantry, of which the local anti-tank platoon is a part. Captain Sims was formerly commander of the unit when it was a full company. Since it has been a platoon it has been under the command of First Lieut. Everett J. Hughes.

Headquarters company, now commanded by Capt. Sims, is the largest company in the regiment and includes 123 enlisted men and three officers. Units that comprise the company are headquarters section, which includes the regimental administrative group; the communications platoon, including telephone and radio technicians; the intelligence section, and the anti-tank platoon. All units except the anti-tank platoon are Portland units and Sims will go to Portland Monday and make his headquarters there until time to go on to Camp Murray.

Captain Sims is a veteran of the World war. He was a sergeant in the 167th Infantry, 42nd division, going overseas with Co. I of Woodburn, 162nd Infantry, October 7, 1920, he enlisted as a private in Co. I of Woodburn, O.N.G., and in the 20 years since then rose to the rank of captain. He was captain of the howitzer company of Woodburn from February 20, 1931, to October 1, 1939, when the company became a platoon. Since then he has been assigned to the regimental staff. He replaces Captain Smith as commander of headquarters company.

The local guardmen will be mobilized Monday and will remain in quarters here until September 23, when they will be sent to Camp Murray near Fort Lewis, Wash.

Oliver S. Olson of Woodburn, now a lieutenant-colonel, will serve with the same regiment.

Scio Voters To Elect Ten

Scio—A mayor, six councilmen, recorder, treasurer, marshal—constituting the elective officers for the city of Scio, are to be elected November 5, according to action taken by the council at the regular September meeting.

Present board of councilmen is made up of the following persons: G. F. Bryan, M. B. Cyrus, Fred Roadarmel, Roy V. Shelton, W. Z. Sims and J. A. Withers. P. W. Schunk is mayor, Joe Lytle recorder, E. D. Myers treasurer, and J. F. Oupor city marshal.

The mayor and several members of the council have indicated they do not care to serve beyond January the next calendar year. They were elected in November, 1938, and assumed office in the following January. Their normal terms of office expired in January, 1939, but they have continued to serve in the absence of election or appointment of successors. Only exception is that of Councilman Roy V.
