

Brothers Meet After 30 Years, One in Jail

Spokane, Wash., Sept. 13 (AP)—Two brothers who had been separated for more than 30 years met again Thursday when Alfred Anderson of Okanogan came to the Spokane jail to visit John Bruce Anderson, held on a first degree murder charge for the "hen house" slaying of a neighbor last July.

Alfred was the first visitor that J. B. Anderson had had since he was brought to the Spokane jail from Yakima early last month and Sheriff Ralph Buckley announced he had signed a confession of the slaying of David Johnson, Marshall farmer, when Johnson caught him robbing a hen house.

After the visit, Alfred, a fruit farmer in the north central Washington district, said he had not seen his brother since they had left their parents' farm "in Kansas," more than 30 years ago.

He had no idea his brother was even in this part of the country until he read that a man by the same name was charged with murder here, he said.

"I don't understand it," he added. "He was a good fellow when we were going to Sunday school together back on the farm. He never got into trouble then."

"I guess there's not much I can do, but I'll do what I can."

Youngsters Sent To Training School

Dallas—David Edmund Dyer and Ferdia LaVern Trumbly, both 18 years of age, were taken to Woodburn to the training school Wednesday afternoon to spend the next six months after which time they will be paroled in case they have behaved themselves.

Both young men were arrested by the West Salem police on April 1 for petit larceny and were taken into the West Salem justice court where they were given a six months jail sentence. On April 5 they were arraigned in circuit court upon informations filed by District Attorney Bruce Spaulding and each pleaded guilty to the following charges: larceny from the Puritan Store, West Salem; larceny from Bunick's store, West Salem; larceny from the Mohawk service station, West Salem; larceny from the public school, West Salem; larceny from Moore's garage, West Salem; and larceny from Rempel's garage in West Salem.

Their pleas of guilty were accepted by Judge Arile G. Walker and he referred their cases to the state parole board.

During their reign of stealing the boys stole several hundred pens and pencils from the public school, most of which were recovered, cigarettes and candy from the grocery stores and miscellaneous small tools from the garages.
