

## Linn Military Prospect List Has 3644 Names

Albany—Linn county has 3644 men of military age under the present draft limits, according to the county draft board, which submitted its report Saturday, to the state board in Salem. In addition to this number approximately 300 men belong to the national guard units of Lebanon and Albany which are already in the service.

The men in the national guard will be credited toward the number to be drafted in this county. The county draft board has secured rooms on the second floor of the Albany post office building and will continue to maintain an office there with a clerk to serve those seeking additional information.

### Scout Drive to Start

The canvassers will strive to raise \$800 for the program, a slight increase over last year's budget. The bridge, when completed, will have cost between \$14,000 and \$15,000 and is so constructed that it will accommodate the heavy logging traffic that courses down the Quivertown road to Foster and Sweet Home.

Castle will appear in court Monday. He is in jail in default of \$300 bail. He was brought here from Bend, where he was arrested.
