GOOD TASTE TODAY

A reader who seems to be making herself rather miserable over what she imagines are two habitual acts of rudeness shown to her by her husband, states her case this way: "Act One—My husband and I are talking with Mr. and Mrs. A, friends of ours, while we are talking Mr. and Mrs. N, casual friends of my husband, stop to greet him. My husband introduces Mr. and Mrs. N to our friends first, and then to me. I believe he should have introduced his wife first. Act Two—We are with a group of people. My husband offers his cigarette case to every one and then to me last. I think I should have come first. Always being last in public rather belittles a wife, doesn't it?"

As already indicated, it is my opinion that the wife who feels belittled in either of these "acts" is completely wrong. In answer to Act One, her husband should have introduced the one standing nearest to the N's. If you were all standing at about the same distance, then introduction to you first would have been natural, because it is what he would do in your own house. A guest should be greeted by hostess (therefore introduced to hostess at once). But if the introduction took place when the A's were hosts, the N's should have introduced to them first. On neutral ground introductions are made according with the natural sequence in which people are standing. Nearest first, farthest away last!

Answer to Act Two: This gesture is completely casual. Cigarettes are always offered first to whoever is nearest. This might even be to a man first, if he were next to host and women across the room.
