

# "Butter Capital" Entertains Another Record Crowd

## Three Million Pounds Butter Made Last Year

Mr. Angel—R. J. Berning, president of the Mt. Angel Co-operative association welcomed the members, on the second day of the two-day annual patrons meeting at 10 o'clock Tuesday morning, which was attended by about another 1500 persons.

Berning announced that 800 new patrons were added during the year, 3,250,000 pounds of butter were manufactured, an increase of over 500,000 pounds. He also asked members to build shelters at roadides for cream cans to hasten delivery at creamery. Mr. Berning introduced the master of ceremonies, Frank Hettwer, manager of the creamery. In his report Hettwer stated that this is the first time in the history of the creamery that over a million dollars of business was done in less than a year. He pointed out that the law to grade cream had wonderful success, and the work of the department of agriculture at Oregon State college was not of polling or inspection, but of improvement in quality and more money in pockets. Clyde Smith of the Sheridan cooperative said he has been coming to this community and looks at this cooperative as an ideal setup, and has spent eight years to find the secret of their success to take home to his people across the river.

Dean William A. Schoenfeld of Oregon State college pointed out the operation of the federal land bank serve the credit needs of the cooperatives of the northwest, while they are glad to loan money to needy "co-ops" they have never had to loan any to Mt. Angel Co-operative and commended the members on the ability to do their own financing. He pointed out, the future outlook of the dairy industry in the country's prospects are that it will increase, especially in the west, due to the new land put into cultivation which will be irrigated since the building of Grand Coulee dam, and on account of the rapid population of the west, the increased production will be taken care of.

Dr. G. H. Wilster, in charge of dairy manufacturing department, O.E.C., stated the educational work they carry on, has developed a better manufactured product. The heavier grade of cream was tested and proved successful in a big saving, in loss of fat in buttermilk.

Bryant Williams, field superintendent of inspectors in his report told members of the progress made in the local creamery in cream grading. During July, August and September, 1939, the grade percent averaged 15 for premium, 80 firsts and 5 seconds; while during the same months of 1940, the premium grade averaged 41 per cent, first grade 37 per cent, and only two per cent of second grade. He stated Mt. Angel creamery made more progress than any other territory.

H. R. (Farmer) Jones, Marion county representative, and Henry Bernard, McMinnville creamery, also spoke, congratulating the creamery on its success.

Governor Charles A. Sprague said Mt. Angel may well be called the "Butter Capital." He commented on the splendid manifestation of community cooperation, and said the territory includes the farming population of a large part of the Willamette valley. At the close of his speech he remarked, "It's a great pride to me to serve the people who are so responsive and so loyal as they are in Oregon."

Berning escorted Governor Sprague through the spacious kitchen where they found the Rev. Hildbrand Melchior washing dishes, and the business men of Mt. Angel and Monitor cooking and serving the big dinner.

In preparing for the dinner, one and one-half tons of sausages, 2100 pounds of potatoes, 250 loaves of bread, 115 gallons sauerkraut, 250 pounds beans, 250 gallons of ice cream, 150 gallons of frozen strawberries, 60 gallons of frozen oysters, 180 gallons of milk, and 80 pounds of butter were used for the two-day dinner.

The Coos Bay Cooperative Oyster Farms supplied the oysters.

The "Haywire" band, members or sons of the creamery gave musical selections. Educational and comedy movies were shown to the patrons waiting for their turn for dinner.
