Snake Dance At Chungking

Chungking, China, Jan. 1 (AP) — United States and British ambassadors and high officials of the German and Italian embassies joined Chinese leaders today in a snake dance which welcomed 1941, the Zodiac calendar snake year, and for the Chinese symbolized their hope to return their government to Nanking before the year is ended.

Leading the twisting line of dancers in Chungking's largest hotel were Dr. H. H. Kung, Chinese vice premier and minister of finance, and Gen. Ho Ying-Chin, minister of war.

Near the head of the line were the ambassadors from the United States and Britain, and farther down the line the German and Italian embassy members.

The Chinese leaders echoed a prophecy by Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek that fighting between Chinese and Japanese forces would end in 1941, in China's favor.

Will Give Airport To Government

Shelton, Wash., Jan. 1 (AP) — Harry Deyette, Mason county auditor, said today the county commissioners have agreed to give the Mason county airport to the government for use by the army as an air field.

The auditor said he did not know if plans are to use the property merely as an emergency landing field or to develop it for more extensive service.

Mason county owns 80 acres of the airport, and leases an additional 40 acres from the state. The state land department in Olympia said the army also is seeking the state's 40 acres. The state is agreeable, the department said, and advised condemnation proceedings to acquire it. Such proceedings have not been started.

Just Another Day At White House

Washington, Jan. 1 (AP) — New Year's day was just another day at the White House.

No special holiday observance was arranged and President Roosevelt planned, aides said, to devote himself to work on his annual and budget messages which go to congress next week.

Mr. Roosevelt, members of his family and a few friends watched the old year die last night. At the stroke of midnight, the chief executive proposed his regular toast for the new year:

"To the United States of America."

Philadelphia Ledger Sold to Cresswell

Philadelphia, Jan. 1 (AP) — The Evening Public Ledger, founded by the late Cyrus H. E. Curtis, has been sold for an undisclosed sum to a new company headed by Robert Cresswell, former treasurer of the New York Herald Tribune.

Announcement of the sale was made last night by trustees of Curtis' estate. Cresswell will be president and publisher, and C. M. Morrison, editor of the Ledger from 1930 to 1939 will return to that position, succeeding George F. Kearney.

"Deeply as America desires to keep out of this war, they will find the necessity laid upon them and in the last resort they will not let freedom perish from the earth," said Smuts, soldier veteran of the World War.

"I feel assured that American intervention is necessary for victory and for the peace which has to be shaped thereafter."

Train-Car Crash Fatal to Farmer

Klamath Falls, Ore., Jan. 1 (AP) — The passing of the old year ended on a grim note in Klamath county last night when James D. Williams, 46, farm worker, was fatally injured in a train-car crash one mile east of Merrill.

Williams' car was struck by an east bound Great Northern freight train traveling 45 miles an hour. He was thrown from the car 150 feet from the point of impact and the car was dragged 1,500 feet down the railroad right-of-way.

Williams' death was Klamath county's 29th traffic fatality in 1940.

Press Credited With Helping Banks

Portland, Jan. 1 (AP) — E. B. MacNaughton, president of the First National bank of Portland, credited the bank's increase in loans during 1940 to "aggressive newspaper advertising."

Of a total of 121,766 new loans reported by 38 Oregon banks from January 1 through June 30, 1940, the First National bank made \$8,061.

"We have constantly and consistently used newspapers to tell the story of our various services, and this has proved the proper channel," MacNaughton said.

Thurmond Warns About S. A. Trade

Tillamook, Ore., Jan. 1 (AP) — Phil Thurmond warned yesterday that the "United States must retain control of trade with South America or lose all of it to Europe when the war is ended."

The Portland Chamber of Commerce maritime manager, recently returned from a six-month tour of South America, said the southern country could become one of the United States' largest markets.

The Darlan-Hitler meeting was said to have taken place in occupied France, somewhere north of Paris on Christmas eve, and was reported in advance reaching Bern, Switzerland, to have presented to Hitler Petain's proposals on how French-German collaboration could be carried out.

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Royal Gold Medal Awarded Wright

London, Jan. 1 (AP) — Award of the royal gold medal for architecture to Frank Lloyd Wright, American architect, was approved today by King George.

(Wright, who designed the Imperial hotel in Tokyo and other noteworthy structures, makes his home at "Taliesin," an estate at Spring Green, Wis.)

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Fruit Cookies

1/2 cup beef drippings
or 1/2 cup butter
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
4 cup molasses
2 1/2 cups flour
2 1/2 cups baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon cloves
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1 cup seedless raisins
2 1/2 cups sweet milk

Cream shortening, add sugar, beaten eggs, a little salt and molasses. Sift dry ingredients with 1 cup flour and add to above mixture; add flour and milk to roll out. Cut with cutter and bake in moderate oven, 350 degrees F. Chop or cut raisins in quarters and add to mixture before rolling.

Save Sugared Jelly
If you have jelly that has sugared, its uses as jelly are over. But it can be used for sweetening sauces, provided they are cooked first. The sugar crystals will dissolve in the hot mixture.

cost and would aggravate the situation which may result when the needs of defense, now a stimulus, later absorb less of our economic productivity."

The plan was listed in five points, as follows:

1. Immediate increase by congressional action of deposit reserve requirements on all federal reserve member banks; authorization for the federal reserve board to double these requirements if necessary in the future; make all banks, whether chartered by the federal government or states, subject to these requirements.

2. Remove president's power to change gold value of the dollar; repeal treasury authority to issue "greenback" money, and repeal treasury authority to issue money against the foreign silver it buys.

3. Neutralize money expansion effect resulting from U. S. purchases of foreign gold.

4. Sell future government securities to individuals and corporations, and not to the banks.

5. Gradually increase taxes until a balanced budget is reached, not later than some future time when the country will have reached its capacity, with appropriate considerations of both employment and production."

The statement complained that the federal reserve system has the responsibility of credit control, but has insufficient powers to "effectively discharge" those duties.

Tillamook Man Killed in Crash

Tillamook, Jan. 1 (AP) — Ice pavements last night threw two automobiles out of control and into a head-on collision, killing Merle Hutton, 22, son of a Tillamook county dairyman.

Hutton was thrown from the car of Harry Groshong and his body impaled on a bumper guard. No one else in either vehicle was injured.
