

Mrs. Reeves To Replace Nona White

Mrs. Florence Reeves of Jefferson is the new county probation officer succeeding Mrs. Nona White, according to announcement made yesterday afternoon by County Judge Leroy Hewlett, who, as judge of the juvenile court, has jurisdiction over the selection of the probation officer.

The new probation officer, he stated, has a deep interest in the matter of juvenile problems, has had experience in school work and is a member of a number of organizations. She is past worthy matron of the Jefferson chapter of the Order of Eastern Star and has served as commander of the woman's benefit association.

The county judge, in releasing news of the appointment, also stated that Mrs. Reeves will not act as jail matron, a duty handled by Mrs. White, but will handle the work of the juvenile court only.

The retiring probation officer, Mrs. Nona White, who has held the position over many years starting during the incumbency of Judge J. T. Hunt, has received high praise for her work in that connection. It is understood that her plans for the present, at least, are indefinite.

While Judge Hewlett announced the change in the probation office, the county court as a whole yesterday afternoon dissolved the county

dog board and it was announced problems handled by that board would come directly before the county court. It is understood that Paul Marnach, license enforcement officer for the board, will be retained. The board has handled funds raised by dog license issuance in the payment of claims for stock killed by dogs. Members of the board were A. C. Eoff, Robert B. Hunsaker and C. C. Cannon. It was stated that abolition of the board will effect a saving of \$180 a year.

The county court at a continued meeting yesterday afternoon discussed further the matter of a mileage basis for operation of cars used by county officials, the general discussion being as to whether the present mileage fee of 4 1/2 cents a mile be raised to 5 cents a mile. County Surveyor Fisher was called in by Judge Hewlett to hear the discussion and he expressed himself as willing to accept a mileage cut to 5 cents a mile from the present 10 cent rate allowed the surveyor by law. Other county cars operate on the 4 1/2 cent basis in an order fixed by the county court.

While the surveyor was there Hewlett brought up the matter of fees received by deputy surveyors and the judge declared hereafter deputy surveyors will be paid by claim at the end of each month. The matter of the 5 cent mileage allowance is still undecided and is to await further investigation.

The court went into executive session for some time yesterday before announcement was made as to the dog board decision and the change in the probation office. No indication was given as to what will be the status of County Engineer Hubbs.

A check of county treasurer's funds made under direction of the state auditing department showed \$290,384.59 in hand, or a 10 cent coverage. Collateral security in banks was also checked and with some other securities turned over along with the cash by the retiring treasurer, Lawrence A. Rich, to the new treasurer, Sam J. Butler, Rich becomes deputy in the office under Butler.
