

Finseth Starts Seventh Term as Mayor for Dallas

Council Changes Will Be Noted In Near Future

Dallas — Mayor Lief S. Finseth embarked upon his seventh term as mayor of the city Monday afternoon when the oath of office was administered by Riley Craven, city auditor and police judge.

When council business in the evening for a regular business meeting, the first of the new year, Craven was called upon to swear in Dr. W. L. Fombertson, ward one, Hollis Smith, ward two, W. C. Retzer, ward three, Dr. H. D. Peterson, ward four, and C. B. Sundberg, councilman-at-large.

Smith is the only newcomer and he takes the place of Maurice Dalton who declined to be a candidate at the election in November and announced his resignation at that time from the council, Riley Craven, city auditor, was sworn in by Oscar Hayer, city attorney.

The council re-elected Oscar Hayer, city attorney, W. G. Vassel, city treasurer, Dave Warren, street commissioner, Tony Neufeldt, city marshal and Herbert Wutzke, police officer. Walter Bird and E. V. Dalton were named as special police officers.

Another change in the personnel of the city "gangs" will take place in the immediate future. Earl Richardson, who represents ward four, will move into a new home within the next few days and his residence is switched from ward four to three. Richardson presented his resignation Monday night.

The city auditor was instructed to give notice in connection with the laying of new sewers on Howe and Maple to the south end of Howe and on Washington from the Fairview avenue intersection to the west end of Washington.

The Federal Security company of Portland bid low in the sale of sidewalk bonds offering \$100.18 for each hundred in the total of \$4,276.10 at the rate of one and three quarters per cent per annum interest. There were six other bids.

A suggestion that another ward be added to the city's present total of four was referred to the city ordinance committee and the city attorney. They will confer with County Clerk Carl S. Graves regarding the matter.

Two bids were received for the gasoline needs of the city for the coming year with Shell Oil company receiving the order.

Committee appointments will be announced at the next regular session of the council January 20 by Mayor Finseth.

Municipal Group Has Few Changes

Albany—Albany's official year began Monday when the old city council met, allowed bills contracted under its regime, and adjourned sine die in favor of the new council.

Excepting for Councilman Alton Ocatte and Fred Forsters, the personnel of the governing municipal body will be the same for the next two years as it was in 1939 and 1940, save for unforeseen withdrawals.

The two named councilmen did not seek re-election and have been replaced by J. J. Nelson and G. A. Flood. The two new councilmen were sworn in by the city recorder.

Appointive offices will be filled at the next regular meeting of the council.

Albany Rotary Parole Plan Given Approval

Albany—District Attorney Harlow Weinrick received a letter Tuesday from Fred Finsley, director of parole and probation for the state parole board, voicing hearty approval of a plan presented to the Albany Rotary club by Weinrick and accepted by that club, looking toward sponsorship of first offenders convicted in local courts.

According to the plan convicted persons would be paroled to members of the club who are willing to undertake sponsorship, instead of to public officials such as the sheriff or district attorney.

Finsley's letter stated that under Oregon law all persons paroled from the bench by presiding judges after being convicted on felony charges must be paroled to the state board.

The state director advised that this procedure still will be followed, that parolees may still be subject to rules and regulations of the board, but he said the board would welcome services of sponsors who might be willing to assist with rehabilitation of first offenders.

"We feel that a local advisor or sponsor can well fit into the picture since our officers have only monthly contact with their charges," Finsley wrote, adding that "we wish to commend you for your initiative in working out a program with your local Rotary club for the individual sponsoring of subjects placed on probation by the courts."

"If every community in the state were as forward-looking as yours, crime would be reduced appreciably and probation could be made to function successfully."

The Rotary club last Friday authorized its president to appoint a liaison agent to act between the district attorney and club members who may consent to become sponsors.
