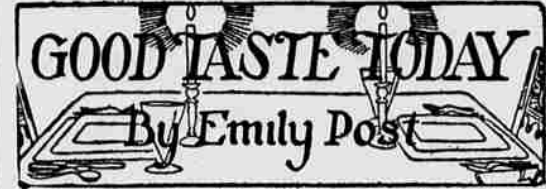
Immediately after the ceremony breakfast was served at the home of the bride's aunts, Misses Anna, Clara, and Theresa Duda, for the bridal group.

## New Shingle Mill Starts Operations

Aurora—A \$10,000 shingle mill is under construction at New Era. The plant will be equipped with two machines, and with 15 men employed on two shifts, will turn out about 2500 squares of shingles per month. The plant probably will be in operation between January 15 and 20, according to J. E. Squire, owner and manager.

The plant, located between the Willamette river and the Southern Pacific tracks, will provide good rail service and the owners say that a wider market for shingles will be possible in southern Oregon and California points.

The Southern Pacific is accepting mixed car business and it now will be possible for the New Era plant to fill half-loaded lumber cars with shingles for delivery in southern points.

"I can't bear cabbage. I don't even like it raw because I hate the smell when it's cooking," remarked some one to me the other day. Most unkind to a vegetable of delicate flavor and color, whether it is served raw or cooked—properly.

Cooked cabbage, a la 1941 should have very little odor during the cooking. The volatile oils do not become strong for some time and during the five to eight minutes necessary they will not have a chance to develop. Shredded cabbage may be cooked in a small amount of water in a tightly covered utensil or uncovered in plenty of salted water.

You may use butter, cream or a thin, well-seasoned cream sauce with boiled cabbage. A few bits of green pepper, a sprinkle of paprika or a few strips of pimiento will add a note of contrasting color to a vegetable which should be practically colorless at this time of year. New cabbage is usually a delicate green in shade.

Once in a while you may like to prepare old-fashioned friend cabbage, which naturally loses some of its color when cooked a short time. Then there is that good combination of cabbage and apples which makes a good luncheon dish or which goes so well with baked ham or pork chops.

Cabbage also finds a place in salads, with French dressing or with my favorite boiled dressing. Sour cream or sweet cream, flavored with a little tarragon vinegar and minced onion, is as good with cabbage as it is with cucumbers.

**Baked Cabbage With Apples**  
4 cups shredded cabbage  
2 cups sliced tart apples  
salt, pepper  
1/4 cup brown sugar, firmly packed  
2 tablespoons vinegar  
2 tablespoons butter

Arrange alternate layers of cabbage and apple in greased baking dish, sprinkle with salt and pepper, cover and bake in hot oven (375 degrees Fahrenheit), about thirty minutes.

**Old-Fashioned Fried Cabbage**  
1/4 cup bacon or ham fat  
4 cups shredded cabbage  
Heat bacon or ham fat in heavy frying pan. Add cabbage and cook over medium heat until well browned, stirring frequently to prevent burning. Season to taste with pepper.

**Quick Meal**  
Cube steak  
Baked Potatoes  
Baked Cabbage and Apples  
Mixed Green Salad  
Cream Potatoes  
Coffee

**Method of Preparation**  
Light oven, scrub potatoes and bake. Prepare baked cabbage and apples and bake. Prepare salad and dressing. Skute cube steak. Make coffee.
