CIO Pickets Defense Plants

Portland, Jan. 8 (AP)—CIO ship scalers picketed three shipyards and repair stations here today in what they said was a jurisdictional fight to obtain recognition.

They blocked entrances to the Willamette Iron & Steel, Albina Engine & Machine and Commercial Iron Works, but most employees, members of the AFL, ignored them. Two pickets, George Chambers and Jesse Crawford, at the Oceanic terminal where Willamette Iron & Steel company workers are converting two steamers into marine transports, said a few men hesitated to pass the picket line.

"We told them to go on through and think it over," they said. "There will be a mass picket line here tomorrow morning."

A spokesman for the union, Rosco Craycraft, accused the firms and the AFL of violating an agreement upon which a national labor relations board hearing was adjourned in December.

Tells of Gas Bi-Products

Development of by-products from the manufacture of gas is making such progress that it is not impossible that these will be the major products in the future and that gas will be one of the by-products, John J. Winn, Jr., commercial manager of the Portland Gas & Coke company, told the Rotary club today noon.

Winn gave a demonstrative talk on the production of gas and the by-products which include road-blinder, briquets, benzol for high test gasoline, carbon for use in the paint and rubber industry, naphthalene for control of agricultural pests and carbon bisulphide for weed control.

The Portland concern is one of the largest industries in Portland, serving 90,000 customers in the territory, paying \$500,000 a year on taxes and a payroll of \$1,500,000 a year. There is around \$22,000,000 invested, much of which is underground in mains leading as far south as Corvallis. These total 2200 miles.

In sketching the history of the gas industry in Oregon, Winn said that the Portland plant, first formed in 1859, was the first west of the Rocky mountains. The Salem plant was started in 1869. Since 1929 all gas consumed in Salem has been manufactured at Olympia, Wash.

Josephine Nibler Dies at Gervais

Gervais—Mrs. Josephine Nibler, 71, died here at 8 o'clock this morning. She was born August 4, 1869, at St. Joseph, Mo., and came to Oregon at the age of 8. She was the wife of August Nibler, who died last January 21.

Services will be held Friday at 9 a. m. in Sacred Heart church with interment in the Catholic cemetery at Gervais. Rosary will be said in the O'Hair chapel in Woodburn at 8 p. m. Thursday. Survivors include a son, H. E. (Ted) Nibler, and seven grandchildren.

Chevrolet Sales Sharply Higher

Detroit, Jan. 8 (AP)—Chevrolet division of General Motors reported Tuesday that its retail sales of new cars and trucks during 1940 totaled 1,046,069 units. In 1939 retail sales aggregated 791,886 vehicles.

Sales for the final month of last year were 95,119 new cars and trucks, an increase of 6,395 over December 1939.

Westminster Hall Bombed

London, Jan. 8 (AP)—The ministry of information today revealed that Westminster cathedral, Westminster city hall and the temple have been damaged in recent German air raids on London.

Westminster cathedral is a great Roman Catholic edifice in Ashley Place close to St. James' park. It was completed in 1903 from the plans of John Francis Bentley.

Constructed of red brick and Portland stone, its architecture is in the early Christian Byzantine style. The nave of the cathedral is 60 feet wide—the widest in Britain.

Damage to the temple has been suffered repeatedly in German raids, most recently during the great fire rained on the city area where the temple buildings are located.

The Westminster city hall is located on Charing Cross road, leading from St. Martin's place to Oxford street.

Italian Youths Called to Colors

Rome, Jan. 8 (AP)—Italy is calling to the colors for army and air force service its military class of 1922, composed of an estimated 250,000 youths 18 years of age, the war ministry announced today.

Previously, Gen. Alfredo Guzzoni, under-secretary of war, disclosed in an order of the day that the class of 1921—youths of 20 years—was being called.

The 1922 class will be given intensive military training after taking the regular medical examination to determine fitness for service.

Youths of the class already had undergone two years of so-called pre-military training, during which they had engaged in regular war maneuvers, often with live fire, and in long marches and tours of camp life. They had been armed with rifles, automatic rifles, machine guns and light artillery.

Those groups destined for the air force had been given glider training and instruction in navigation, so that they would enter formal service with experience almost equal to that of qualified pilots.

3000 More on Payroll of NYA

Portland, Jan. 8 (AP)—An additional 3000 persons will be placed on the National Youth Administration's Oregon payroll before June, Ivan Munro, state director, said today.

Tentative estimates give Oregon an additional \$50,000 for in classes related to national defense, he said.

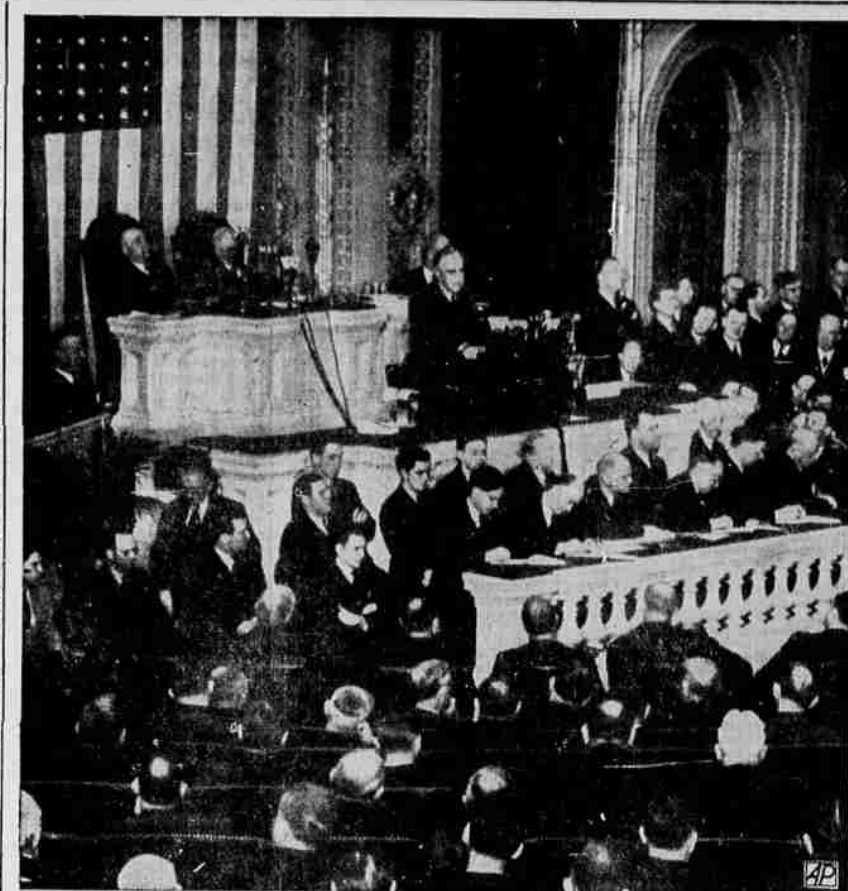

Indian Funds Slightly Cut

Washington, Jan. 8 (AP)—Appropriation of \$27,020,808 for the office of Indian affairs in the next fiscal year, \$402,755 less than the current year's funds, was asked today by President Roosevelt in his budget message. The appropriations would be in addition to moneys from trust funds.

For general support and administration the president recommended appropriation of \$2,624,800. It was \$2,884,520 this year.

For conservation of health the president recommended \$5,879,615 against \$5,728,210 for the current year.

Increases over the current year recommended for Indian hospitals included: Washington—Yakima, \$40,000 to \$42,216; Colville, \$35,000 to \$40,232.

Decreases recommended for Indian hospitals included: Washington—Tacoma \$233,985 to \$233,930.

Purposes for which unchanged appropriations were recommended included: maintaining reservoirs on Yakima reservation (Washington), \$11,000.

Municipal Finance Officers to Meet

Carl H. Chatters of Chicago, Illinois, executive director of that association, will be guest speaker and will discuss governmental finance and accounting problems.

R. Earl Riley, mayor of Portland, and state chairman of the Municipal Finance Officers Association, will also be present and will explain the association's activities in Oregon.

Mr. Chatters was active as a municipal finance officer in Flint, Michigan, for more than ten years and has served as executive director of the Municipal Finance Officers Association since 1932. He is also secretary of the National Association of Assessing Officers and of the National Committee on Municipal Accounting. He has been instrumental in the organization of the National Association of State Auditors, Controllers and Treasurers.

Mr. Chatters is the author of several books relating to municipal finance and accounting and is considered an outstanding authority on those subjects.

Marion Still Minus A County Physician

The appointment of a county physician remained undecided today after a conference between the county court and Dr. Ray M. Waltz, sole applicant. M. E. Holcombe, director for the county welfare commission, was called in and explained the medical setup for the county which showed some complicated phases. It also revealed that not only is the county without a physician at the present time, but with the departure of Drs. Hayes and Hockett from the relief committee medical service that committee has no physician in its employ and will have none until the state welfare commission certifies some names which will be at least a month and may

be longer, stated Holcombe. Physicians for this type of service are very difficult to secure due to national defense demands, he stated.

He explained the medical setup in the county at present and the divided duties. The health unit under Dr. Douglas, he stated, handles general health and sanitation problems mainly and is not a medical service dispensing agent in the strict terms. The welfare commission had a medical director at \$250 a month and an assistant, who was Dr. Hockett, at \$135 a month. He not only assisted the director but took responsibility for surgical cases.

The county physician, the job under consideration, he explained, had for its duties care of inmates of the county jail and county poor farm. Insane examinations were separate and apart and it was only by coincidence these were handled by Dr. Hockett when he was county physician, from which post he resigned several weeks ago. Holcombe said that the jail and poor farm job, if properly handled, should include Wasserman tests and physical examinations for men coming into the jail. He also said that because of the nature and age of most of the poor farm inmates medical service took much time and attention. He stated that he believed the duties of the county physician and the assistant physician to the welfare commission should be separated to avoid confusion in the future.

It developed at the session that for some time Dr. Hockett was receiving no compensation as county physician but evidently was throwing in his care of jail and poor farm inmates as a gratuity.

Dr. Waltz stated he would not accept the post of assistant medical adviser to the welfare commission at \$135 a month even if it were offered to him as he stated the work was too much for the money.

No agreement was reached as to what a county physician should be paid for just caring for inmates of the jail and poor farm.

The matter was temporarily held in abeyance with the understanding Dr. Waltz will care for the jail and poor farm inmates on a fee basis until a general readjustment of the whole situation is had.

Judge Hewitt said as a rule he was opposed to a physician being assigned alone to such an institution as the jail as the inmates were inclined to abuse the privilege of such medical service.

School Escape Held in Sacramento

Sacramento, Jan. 8 (AP)—James D. McLarty, 17, who says he walked out of an Oregon reformatory because "they wouldn't give me books to complete my high school education," remained in the county jail today awaiting a decision as to whether he will be sent to a federal reformatory.

The youth was sentenced in federal court recently to two years on a charge of stealing a federal check for \$22.50 in a Santa Rosa hotel. Judge Martin I. Welsh has under consideration his plea for probation.

McLarty said he was committed to a state reformatory in Oregon for taking \$3 from an unlocked house while hitch-hiking to his grandmother's home in Portland.

Water Consumption In Salem in 1940

Approximately 2,182,798 gallons of water were consumed in Salem during 1940, Manager Carl Guenther of the City of Salem Water department, said today.

Of this total the people of the community drank up or otherwise consumed about their premises a total of 1,710,798 gallons. For flushing streets approximately 4,000,000 gallons were used, and for all other purposes, including fires, the consumption was 468,000,000 gallons.

Eugene Drinks 1,425,000,000 Gallons

Eugene, Jan. 8 (AP)—Water consumption in the city of Eugene during 1940 increased more than 18 per cent over the previous year. A total of 1,425,000,000 gallons was consumed.

County Rejects Premier Offer On Bond Issue

The county court today rejected an offer of Charles N. Trip, Inc., bond investment house of Portland, of a premium payment of \$2412.40 on the Silverton school bond issue for \$74,000, bonds of which were bought and have been held by the county.

County Judge Hewitt said the offer had been submitted to him and he had discussed it with Deputy County Treasurer Lawrence Rich, who advised against acceptance. Rich was called in and explained his reasons for believing the court should reject the apparently attractive offer to make \$2412.40 off-hand.

The bonds carry interest at 2 1/2 per cent and will be retired at the rate of \$5000 a year from 1941 through 1953. Rich said the offer seemed very attractive, and probably would be from the standpoint of an individual, but not from the county's standpoint. The county is receiving interest at the rate of \$1800 a year and two years will repay the premium offered and more, he said. This will drop at the rate of \$250 a year, starting with 1942.

He stated the treasurer has the right to levy a tax on a school district to pay off bonds, and thus the county has certain control over these bonds should stringent times come along. He also said it would be necessary for the county to reinvest and if reinvestment were made in government bonds it would probably be necessary to pay nearly as large a premium to secure a similar amount of government bonds and the county would have no control over the government securities such as it has over the school district bonds. In light of the explanation the court deemed it wise and expedient to retain the bonds in its own list of assets.

Huggins Appointed To Legislature

Coquille, Jan. 8 (AP)—George O. (Coke) Huggins, member of the Huggins Insurance firm of Marshfield and Salem, school board member and one-time high school coach at Marshfield, will succeed J. H. (Bertie) McCloskey as democratic state representative in the Oregon legislature.

Huggins was named today by a republican Coos county court out of three democrats suggested by the county central committee. The two others approved were George H. Chaney of Coquille, former state senator, and William J. Conrad, Marshfield lumber mill operator. Huggins is a long time Marshfield resident and is past president of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce.

District School Of Religion Opens

Edgar Purdy, district superintendent, and Miss Pearl Sherlock, director of religious education of the Oregon conference, opens tonight at 7:30 o'clock at the First Methodist church. The course includes: "The Prophecy and Their Message," taught by Dr. Gertrude Boyd Crane, Pacific university faculty member; "Ways of Teaching," Miss Pearl Sherlock; "The Use of the Bible With Children," Miss Ruby Perrine, director of religious education, Westminster Presbyterian church, Portland; "Methods and Materials With Young Adults," Rev. Howard Seymour, pastor of Fremont Methodist church, Portland; "Planning the Program in the Local Church," Dr. J. Edgar Purdy.

The school is being supported by all Methodist pastors and churches in the central Willamette valley.

Portland to Get Shipbuilding Yard

Washington, Jan. 8 (AP)—Senator Holman (R.-Ore.) said today he had been assured by Rear Admiral Emory S. Land, chairman of the maritime commission, that Portland, Ore., will be allocated one of the shipyards to be constructed with federal funds to speed construction of merchant ships.

Holman said he conferred with Land today and discussed the program under which 250 merchant ships were to be built. He said Land told him that while no amount had yet been decided upon, Portland had been selected as site for one of the yards.

Holman said how many ships would be constructed there and the location and size of the yard were yet to be determined.
