

Lebanon Will Issue Bonds; Pupils Better

Lebanon—This city will issue \$30,000 worth of bonds as soon as the finance committee of the council prepares them for sale. The bond sale is necessary to build up a city treasury depleted last year by advancements for the purchase of equipment on the joint city-WPA street and sewer improvement project the Lebanon council held.

Chairman Ralph Scroggin and the finance committee were told by the council to prepare the bonds for immediate sale, either to public or private buyers, depending upon rates of interest offered.

Enrollment Gains

Lebanon—A sharp rise in enrollment in Lebanon high and grade school since the first of the year was noted here when 17 students from other cities transferred here. Seven registered at the high school and 10 in the elementary grades. Superintendent M. E. Coe reported attendance about normal this week after the flu epidemic which struck here prior to the holidays. He said that chickenpox is responsible, along with flu, for the current student absences.

Firemen Make Fine Showing

Mt. Angel—Louis A. Schwab, secretary-treasurer of the Mt. Angel fire department, handed in the following report to the city council of the activities of the fire department during the year 1940:

During this year the department answered 39 calls, of which 23 were in the city and 16 in the country. Fourteen of the city calls were fire fires and the other nine were from other causes, six of which were from defective chimneys.

Twelve regular and one special meetings were held, also twelve regular and two special drills. They also had 28 regular and two special cleanups. There were two fire drills conducted during the year, at both the parish school and the academy.

They also sponsored and took charge of a fire prevention program in the schools and neighboring schools. All the members also completed their first aid courses.

Of the city fires, the value of property involved was \$73,500. Amount of insurance carried was \$33,900. Loss sustained was \$55.
